ORDINANCE No. 169

An Ordinance to amend Section 3 of Ordinance No. 166 of the City of Las Vegas.
The Board of Commissioners of the City of Las Vegas Do Ordain as follows:

Section 1. Section 3 of Ordinance No. 166 of the City of Las Vegas, entitled "An Ordinance of the City of Las Vegas regulating the erection, construction, enlargement, alteration, repair, moving, removal, demolition, conversion, occupancy, equipment, use, height, area, and maintenance, of all buildings and/or structure in the City of Las Vegas; providing for the issuance of Permits, and collection of fees therefor; providing penalties for the violation thereof; declaring and establishing Fire Zones; Repealing Ordinances Nos. 144-27-59-61 and 72 of the City of Las Vegas and all other Ordinances in conflict therewith and the same is hereby amended, so that the same shall read as follows:
"Section 3. That, the entire incorporated area of the City of Las Vegas is hereby declared to be and is hereby established as a Fire District and said Fire District shall be known and designated as Fire Zones 2 and 3, and each such zone shall include such territory or portions of said City as illustrated, outlined and designated on a certain map on file in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Las Vegas, being marked and designated as "Fire Zones of the City of Las Vegas, as amended in connection with Ordinance No. 169 of said City," which is hereby adopted as the fire zoning map of the City of Las Vegas for the application of the regulations included in the "Uniform Building Code, 1930 Edition, published May, 1930, by Pacific Coast Building Officials' Conference."

Section 2. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately after its passage and publication as herein after authorized and this Ordinance is passed as an emergency ordinance under the provisions of a Resolution adopted by the Board of City Commissioners on this 4th day of June, 1931.
Section 3. The City Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to have this Ordinance published in Las Vegas Age, a daily newspaper published in the City of Las Vegas, for a period of one week 16 issues. I hereby certify that the foregoing Ordinance was read for the first time at a regular meeting of the Board of Commissioners of the City of Las Vegas, held on the 4th day of June, 1931, and was passed as an emergency ordinance under the provisions of said last mentioned date, on the following vote: Commissioners German, Mundy, Hanson, Thomas and his Honor the Mayor E. W. Cragin, voting Aye; Noes lone.

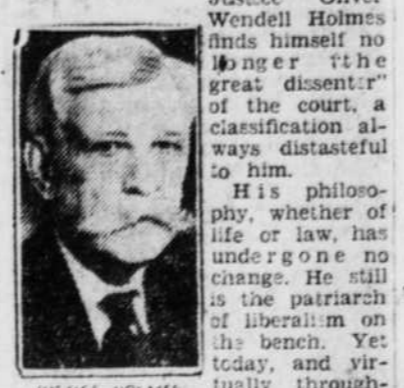

WASHINGTON BYSTANDER

WASHINGTON-In the ninetieth year of his life and the twenty-ninth of his supreme court service, Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes finds himself no longer the great dissenter of the court, a classification always distasteful to him.



His philosophy, whether of life or law, has undergone no change. He still is the patriarch of liberalism on the bench. Yet today, and virtually throughout the months since Charles Evans Hughes became chief justice and Owen Roberts of Pennsylvania junior associate justice the venerable dean of the court has found himself almost invariably aligned with the majority instead of the minority of the court in decisions involving the issue of liberalism.

Two cases in point
The thought is prompted by the court's action in disposing on a single day of two cases of special note, the California "red flag" matter and the Indiana chain store case.

An exception
Students of supreme court proceedings to whom the Bystander has talked say there is but one instance involving that question of liberalism vs. conservatism, in which Chief Justice Hughes has not found his mind in agreement with those of Holmes, Brandeis, Stone and Roberts.
