

### WORK STARTED ON PENNEY'S STORE

#### To Be Built to Hold Up to Three Stories On Lower Fremont

Actual work was started yesterday on the new J. C. Penney Company store building next to the Golden hotel at Fremont and Fourth streets on the lots formerly occupied by the Tavern.

The Tavern building was raised bodily and moved to a location on north Sixth street during the week by A. V. Murphy, moving contractor. Yesterday, J. T. McWilliams laid out the ground for the beginning of excavation.

The new store will occupy a space 50 by 130 feet and will have a basement thirty-seven by fifty feet. It will be of concrete one story, seven-tenths and walls will be constructed to the ground walls will be constructed to properly support one or two additional stories if deemed feasible in the future. James A. Fleming is the architect of the new building, which will provide fifteen hundred square feet more floor space than in the present building occupied by the company.

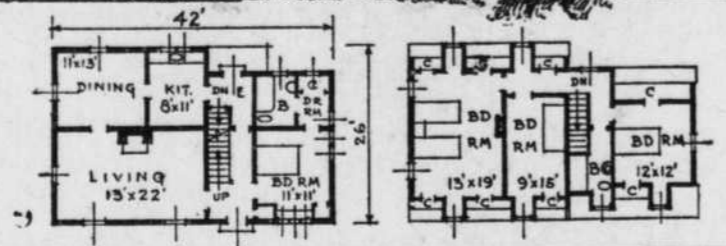

### WALLS OF HOUSE SHOW THE EFFECT OF VARIED MATERIAL

There are four bedrooms in this house of pleasing design in which varied materials have been effectively combined. From an exterior view there is interest in the use of brick walls on half the house and stucco on the remainder—as also appears a sense of good proportion of window openings to wall space. The brick, well burnt, in dark reds and browns is in harmony with the light buff or cream of the stucco, this pleasing contrast also extends



ing to the roof of slate or tile in warm grays, sepals or burnt siennas. The chimneys are of the same brick used for the walls, while the chimney pots of light buff stucco repeat the contrast of the varied wall material below. All trim and exterior woodwork should be well weathered after first being surface-bleached by burning and then sand-blasted. For the cement windows—attractive in this type of house—one might choose green or gray, or possibly black.

### PERMITS ISSUED FOR \$37,200 WORTH OF VEGAS BUILDING

#### Structures Range In Sizes From Apartments To Small Cabins and Large Homes

Many permits have been issued through the last week for the construction of dwellings and business houses in Las Vegas while each section of the city is fast being filled with houses of every description: from the small cabins to large and more costly homes.

Following are the permits that have been issued during the week: A. P. Denning has permit to build a Duplex costing \$3500 at First and Stewart streets. He also has a permit to build a \$3000 dwelling on north Seventh street.

Ed Wasserbach will build himself a private garage to cost \$600. It will be located in the Boulder Addition. J. Penn has a permit for a dwelling in Westside to cost \$400.

E. A. Owen, 121 south Sixth, cabins costing \$200.

D. M. Story will erect five dwellings on South Seventh. The cost will be \$1000.

H. J. Kipp will build a retail store just north of the Mermaid pool, costing \$400.

R. Linzey, Stewart and Second streets, Westside, will construct a dwelling costing \$400.

J. P. Johnson has a permit to build a dwelling at 225 North Sixth street. The cost will be \$650.

A. Segurdson will erect four dwellings at 202 North Sixth costing \$200 each.

A. T. Leeson will build a house at Stewart and First streets in Westside. It will cost \$1000.

E. M. Dodsie received a permit to build a garage at 413 South Fourth street costing \$100.

T. P. Schultz is the contractor for a store building to be built for Boggs Bros. on Fremont street. It will cost \$22,750.

R. A. Morion will build a dwelling at 123 South Eleventh street costing \$3000.
