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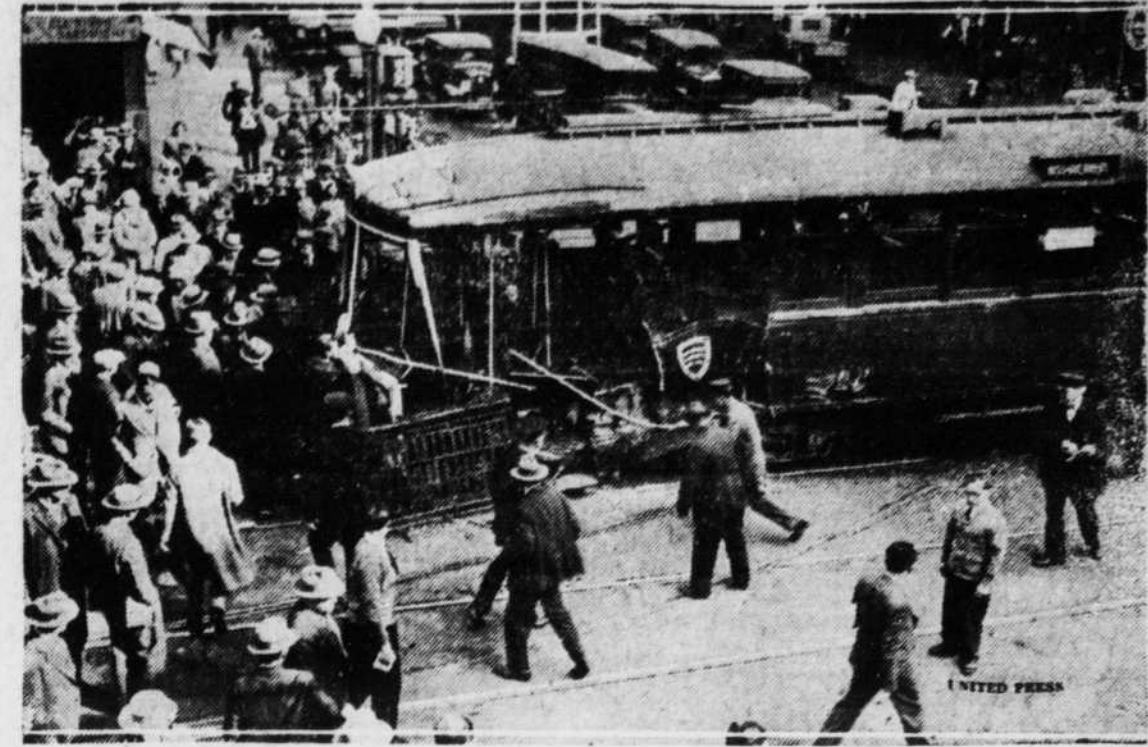

EMPIRE MINE SHOWS GOOD ORE FROM NEW CUT

Development Work Is Changed As Ledge Outcropping Found Mill For Property Is Seen in Near Future Believes Gresh

Most encouraging developments in the Eldorado Empire mine, Eldorado canyon, are reported by C. E. Gresh, general manager of the company. The work of development on the property was entirely changed in character by the discovery of a ledge outcroppings on the surface about six weeks ago. The discovery revealed the fact that the drifts which were run from the shaft at the 100-foot level were parallel with the ledge and that the assumption on which the first development was made was entirely erroneous.

BOULDER DAM WORKER KILLED IN CAR CRASH

A man believed by Coroner Frank M. Ryan to be J. A. Wilson, an employee of J. N. Gordon, at the Boulder dam, was almost instantly killed this morning in a crash while he was being brought to the police station. The fatal crash occurred about a mile and a half east of town. According to Thurman Schmitto, former Six Companies employee at the dam site, who accompanied him, Wilson and an unidentified companion attempted to break into the Boulder service station across the highway from the Texas Moon dance pavilion.

The service station owner, Louis Potter, and Schmitto, frustrated the alleged housebreaking. Potter and Schmitto grabbed Wilson but his companion fled across the desert, away from the highway. Potter then asked Schmitto to bring Wilson into Las Vegas in a Ford delivery truck belonging to the station. On the road, according to Schmitto's story, Wilson who was riding in the bed of the truck, crawled down over the fender to the running board, opened the door to the driver's cab and attempted to make Schmitto stop the car. JOINT BUREAU MAY HANDLE BOULDER JOBS

CARSON CITY, June 11 (AP)—Approval of a recommendation that responsibility for hiring labor on the Boulder Canyon dam project be placed entirely in the hands of a joint federal-state employment service is anticipated shortly from Washington by State Labor Commissioner William Royle. The proposed arrangement would relieve Six Companies, Inc., general contractors for Hoover dam, of whatever responsibility it now has of interviewing and placing labor, thereby eliminating much duplication of effort existing under present employment methods.

Royle, who also is federal director of employment for Nevada, said today that should Director General Francis I. Jones of the federal employment service approve his recommendation he would leave immediately for Las Vegas to arrange for the transfer of his staff to Boulder City, where it would be quartered in the administrative building of Six Companies. He added he had advised the director general he considered unwise a proposal by the federal reclamation service that the employment office be located in its building at Boulder.

Six Companies is in complete accord with his recommendations. Royle said, because it is in line with a proposal made by the contractors at a recent conference at Las Vegas. Shifting of the employment office to the actual scene of construction, he said, would enable his staff to meet the labor needs of the company as fast as they arise.

BOULDER FOLK CANNOT VOTE

Inhabitants within the federal reserve, which includes Boulder City, will be unable to vote in Clark county elections and even the election for president, stated Louis Cramton, special attorney to secretary of the interior, in an interview yesterday afternoon. Property belonging to the residents of Boulder City will not be subject to state or county taxes, announced Cramton; but in spite of being freed of this, the people of Boulder City will also lose all power of electing their own local officers.

All laws of Nevada are without effect in Boulder City and if the inhabitants wish to vote and live under Nevada rules they will have to move out of the limits of this government reserve. Mr. Cramton also announced that no provision had been made for the establishment of a high school in Boulder City, and that students of secondary school age would probably attend classes in Las Vegas unless such an institution is arranged later by the government.

SEARCHLIGHT AGOG OVER DUPLEX FIND

New Ore Runs to \$700 On 800 Foot Level Of Famous Mine

Old Camp Electrified Over Strike; Mill Is Running 3 Shifts

Reports of a strike of gold ore on the famous Duplex mine in Searchlight were confirmed late yesterday when C. J. Harvey returned from the camp. On the 800-foot level a large body of ore has been uncovered that assays \$700 per ton in gold and runs 22 1/2 per cent in lead. On the 500-foot level a large body of ore has been found that assays \$304 in gold and 3 1/2 per cent in lead. Another statement that has electrified the old gold camp is the confirmed report that the concentrates which have been shipped from the Duplex have made a net return of \$200 per ton. The concentrates are from the new mill which was put in operation last April.

The report of the new strike is spreading like wildfire and it is expected that within the next few days Searchlight, that has been the scene of death for many years, will take on the air of a new Goldfield. The Duplex is only one of many mines that were large producers years ago. With the finding of new bodies of ore on the lower levels, it is a certainty that many of the properties will start operations. The work that has been progressing on the Duplex since the first of May has been closely watched by owners of other properties.

THREE SHIFTS The Duplex is now owned by a group of men headed by A. H. MacCarthy, W. J. Loring and Dr. William MacCarthy, all of Los Angeles. Fifty men are now employed at the mine, working three shifts.

RENOMINATION OF HOOVER FORECAST

WASHINGTON, June 11 (AP)—Calls for the re-election of President Hoover were voiced by administration leaders before a conference of Young Republicans here today.

Senator Fess of Ohio, chairman of the Republican national committee, opened the Hoover campaign with a prediction of his unanimous renomination. Representative Free of California followed with a speech devoted to the life history of President Hoover. He also said the president would be re-elected.

The Young Republicans is an unofficial group of youthful members of the party, called together by Robert Lucas, executive director of the Republican national committee. They cheered the Hoover declarations enthusiastically.

CRASHES INTO 5-TON TRUCK

Rushing into Las Vegas, Jim Bloomer, employed at Boulder City by Six Companies, Inc., crashed into the lethal chamber at Nevada state prison today, preparatory to making a report to Governor James Rolph on the bill recently passed by the California legislature, that would substitute lethal gas for the gallows in execution in that state.

The visiting officials declined to make a statement as to what their recommendation would be. Governor Rolph has the bill before him, for signature or veto.

DEALING NEW BLOW TO CRIME

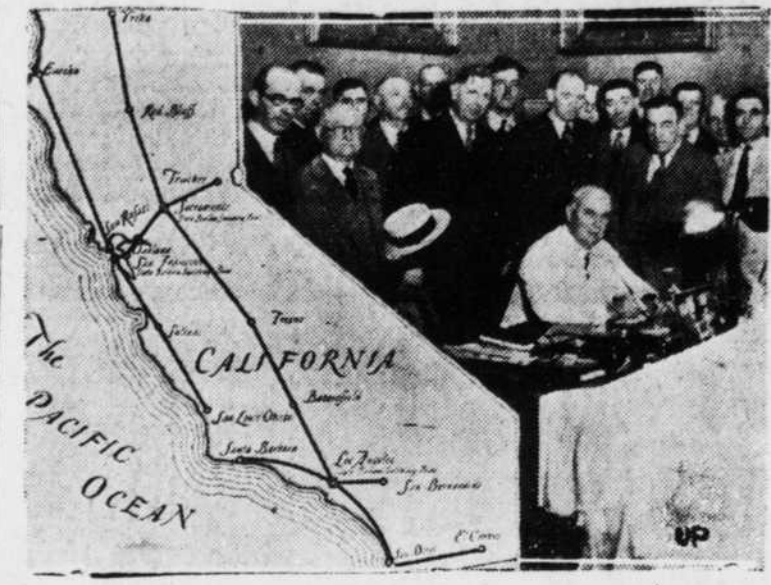

SEVERAL HURT YANKEE BOAT WHEN JAIL STORMED

ST. CLAIRSVILLE, Ohio, June 11 (AP)—Sheriff Howard Guss tonight was adding a force of fifty special deputies to strengthen the guard around the county jail, following an attempt of twelve hooligan miners and their families to break into the jail today. Two women and one man received medical attention.

In an attempt to arrest Leo Thompson, Pittsburgh, reputed strike leader, Sheriff Guss was beaten by miners who came to Thompson's rescue. Guss feared further demonstrations tomorrow after he learned that leaders of the strike said they would go into pits and drag the strike breakers out.

Armed with machine guns and tear gas bombs the sheriff's forces turned back the miners. Twelve persons, seven women and five men, were overcome with gas when the forces of the law tossed tear bombs into the milling crowds which stormed the jail. Two women and one man received medical attention.

BOARD PLANS TRAFFIC LAW TO OPEN BIDS ON MORMON MESA OIL

CARSON CITY, June 11 (AP)—The Nevada state highway department will open bids on eight road projects during the month of July. Department engineers estimated today the combined cost of the projects will approximate \$465,500. Included in the bids opened July 1 will be those for the oiling of 19.68 miles in Clark county from the west slope of the Mormon mesa to the lower Virgin river bridge. The estimated cost is \$48,000.

GARRISON IS BOUND OVER

SAN DIEGO, June 11 (AP)—Moss E. Garrison, middle aged suitor of Hazel Bradshaw, was bound over to the superior court late today, on the charge of murdering the twenty-two year old telegraph girl in Balboa park.

In his closing argument in the preliminary hearing before Judge Janey, Deputy District Attorney Sany Bristow, condemned the act of Garrison's kissing the girl's cold brow in an undertaking parlor. "I call it the kiss of Judas," the prosecutor said.

Bristow reacted against the stabbing with an striking imaginary knife first at the arm and then the shoulder and finally the breast. The court bound Garrison over for trial remanding him to the county jail without bail.

There was no recurrence of the disorder of yesterday, when Bristow's attempt to cross examine was met by hisses. Garrison is accused of stabbing the girl to death while escorting her home from the theater. He claims he left her at her home and that she later must have another date with the night.
