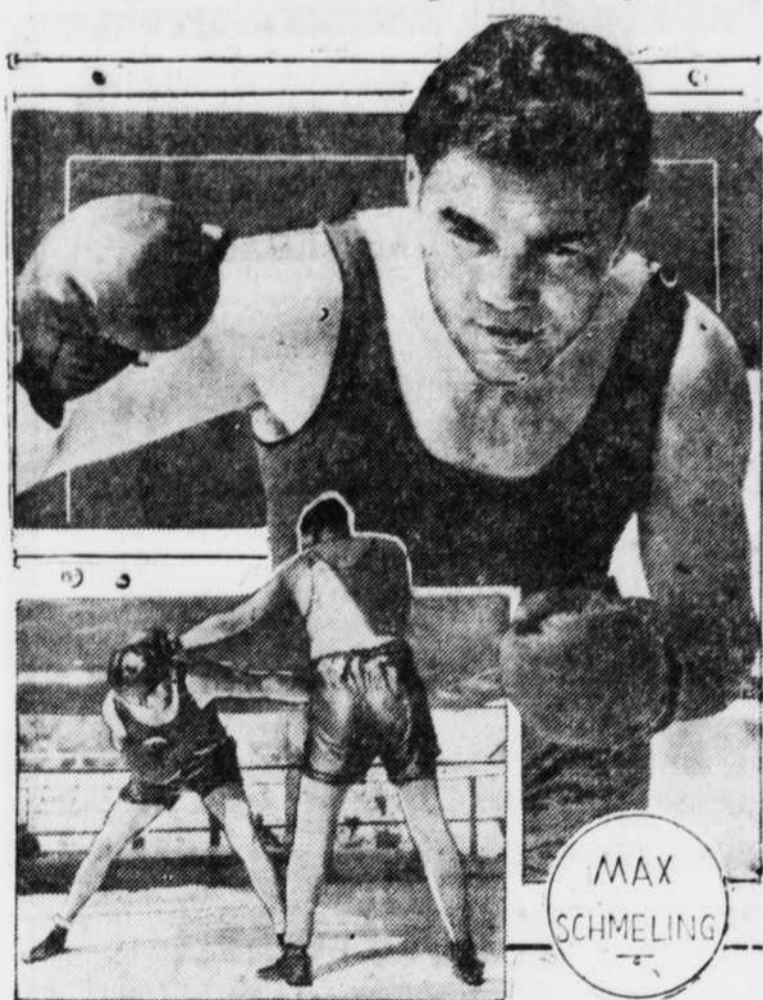

Overstuffed Lads To Take Wallops Needed At Schmeling Training Camp



Mind a sock on the jaw if there's a day's pay in it? If not apply to Max Schmeling's training-camp at Connaut Lake Park, Pa., where the champion is preparing for his title bout with Young Stribling July 3 at Cleveland. The hefty lad shown in the ring with "der Maxie" shows what's needed to hold the job.

CONNAUT LAKE PARK, Pa., June 12. (AP)—Overstuffed glove-catchers who can take a lot of mauling are on the "help wanted" list at the camp of Max Schmeling, who is to defend his heavyweight title against W. L. "Young" Stribling at the Cleveland stadium July 3.

In preparing for his bout with Stribling, "der Maxie" is following the example of his notable predecessor, Jack Dempsey. For sparring partners he's seeking great mountains of men who can take heavy rains of lefts and rights with ease. But Schmeling is more discriminating than Dempsey was in preparation for his fight with Jess Willard. Almost any farmhand was good enough for the Manassa boy to maul around, whereas those sparring with Schmeling have had some ring experience.

One of the four, Tony Marullo of New Orleans, a trial horse retired from active competition, provided some rights and lefts for Maxie to remember, however.

The champion showed some good work at blocking and counter-punching, but his fighting did not appear strictly orthodox. He didn't always lead with his left, often shifting to his right. He hit from almost any angle, and retained his power to hit hard despite his lack of balance.

The champion plans on a month of training before the bout. Since his battle with Jack Sharkey he has had no great amount of rigorous training.

For the most part he's had a long period of rest, with the exception of a series of exhibition bouts with fighters of little consequence—and overnight rides on sleeping cars between exhibitions did him no good.

Most of Schmeling's time here is spent in golfing, bowling, speed boating, fishing, playing tennis and flying his airplane.

PARTY SEEKS GREENLAND HERDS

COPENHAGEN (AP)—For various purposes, including that of refuting certain Norwegian claims to parts of eastern Greenland, Dr. Lauge Koch, eminent scientific explorer, will head a large Danish expedition to Greenland June 16.

The expedition is partly financed by Denmark and will remain away three years.

One of Dr. Koch's theories, which will be investigated, is that the Greenland inland ice is not as extensive as commonly believed.

On certain sections of the east Greenland coast he has seen in the distance mountain ranges covering thousands of square miles. The ranges are not part of the inland ice, Dr. Koch says, but on the maps they are so indicated.

Wedged in between these ranges he expects to find valleys, fertile in the Greenland sense, and perhaps roaming herds of animals, such as the musk ox and perhaps even reindeer. Eskimos may be able to find a living in such valleys, Dr. Koch believes.
