SAID WILSON REVIVED

Schmittou's story was that while enroute to town, Wilson had revived from the blow on his head, had climbed down on the running board of the car and reaching into the closed cab, had struck Schmittou a dazing blow, causing the upset of the truck. Schmittou crawled out of the vehicle and found Wilson pinned by the head under the cab.

Despite the verdict, both Potter and Schmittou were returned to jail to await any action the district attorney's office might deem proper under the circumstances.

A discrepancy in the accounts of Schmittou and Potter was that immediately after the crash they claimed that Wilson had been struck on the head with the butt of a revolver. An exhibit, introduced at the inquest as the weapon used was a blood-smeared auto jack lever.

Indicating that Wilson was already wounded when put into the car, a canvas tarpaulin, also showing blood stains, was exhibited.

LEAVES FAMILY

Wilson who was fifty-five years old, is survived by a wife who lives in Victorville, Calif., and two sons. He was a member of the Odd Fellows and had come to Las Vegas about two months ago to work at the Boulder dam.

The body of the deceased will be taken to Victorville by a brother-in-law, Lawrence Fisk.

FERTILIZERS URGED FOR RANCHES

While manure is one of the best garden fertilizers for use in Nevada, it is not, in the opinion of V. E. Spencer, associate professor of soil research in the Nevada experiment station, a complete plant food and should be supplemented by some commercial fertilizer if the best results with flowers and vegetables are desired.

FERTILIZERS GOOD
Manure supplies organic matter which makes earth loose and easily worked, according to Spencer, and prepares the soil so that it will both drain and hold moisture better, a factor particularly valuable in Nevada, where irrigation is necessary.

Certain plant food elements, however, the experiment station man says, are not present in it in sufficient quantities, and they should be supplied through commercial fertilizer. Both types of fertilizer, barnyard manure and commercial fertilizer, are needed by most Nevada gardeners, he says.

For general use, any of the complete fertilizers containing about 4 per cent nitrogen, 12 per cent phosphoric acid and 4 per cent potash, is suited to Nevada gardens. The commercial fertilizer should be applied at the rate of about twenty pounds to one thousand square feet, according to Mr. Spencer.

NEW BARBECUE TO OPEN IN LAS VEGAS TODAY

Transforming the former Elks home on South Main street into a delightful little resort, the French Barbecue will be opened today to the public of Las Vegas.

G. Fotis and G. Cresto, formerly of Detroit, Mich., came here recently to survey the Las Vegas field, of which they had heard so much. They were of the belief that a small family resort, where dancing and dining could be found, maintained in an orderly fashion, and where it would be possible to take one's family, would be the proper thing for this city.

Both men, with Michael Papp, owner of the Little Oasis, decided that real barbecued meat would be the chief offering of the new place. Several weeks have been spent on the establishment. A dance hall, with a neat little floor, surrounded by comfortable booths with upholstered seats, a series of cosy little cabins, a dining room where women can hold their card parties, or where civic organizations may serve banquets, all have been accomplished by the enterprising trio and are incorporated in the new resort.

One of the outstanding features of the place is the garden, walks outlined by gleaming white rocks, centered by a big flowing well that sends more like a natural spring, and the whole shaded with a cluster of cottonwood and willow trees. The temperature at the French Barbecue is said to be more than fifteen degrees cooler than in the city.

Concentrating on a few well-chosen dishes, the entire time of the dining room and kitchen force will be spent on the barbecuing of prime steer beef, sucking pig and lamb. Italian spaghetti with genuine mushroom sauce, wholesome Italian salad, and the barbecued meats with a secret sauce, ice cream and coffee will be the mainstay of the French Barbecue menu. Dinner will be served from 5 p. m. to 10 p. m.

The management asks that all persons who find fault with their food, service or surroundings, immediately make their wants known.

Fertilizer should be well mixed with the soil throughout the spaded layer. This is properly done several days before the flowers or vegetables are planted.

EFFECTIVE METHODS
When the plants are to be isolated from each other, the fertilizer will be more effective if applied in the row or hill, and well mixed with the soil.

The addition of commercial fertilizer to the soil, if properly applied, will increase the quality and the yield of both flowers and vegetables, Spencer states.

The jobs had gathered at Carboneau with threats of raiding stores unless given food or work. After the police had restored order, a member of the assembly from the Carboneau district advised the crowd to disperse, pending negotiations for relief.

The dole had been discontinued, due to recent financial crisis, which restricted the treasury.

About twelve hundred men will be out of work a week from tomorrow, when the Dominion Iron and Fuel company, operators of the Belle Island mine, carry out the closure order. The men for the most part have been jobless for a year.
