The Odd Fellows and Rebekahs had a notable meeting yesterday morning on the courthouse lawn. After the grammar school band had given a concert a group of the grand officers of the two orders gathered on the courthouse steps.

Grand Marshall Harley A. Harmon introduced Mayor E. W. Craig who, in a brief address in which he welcomed the visitors to "the fastest growing city in Nevada," presented the key to the city to Grand Master J. J. Jackson.

The grand master, in his turn, thanked the mayor and people of Las Vegas for their hospitality and stated that inasmuch as "the key to the city had been conferred to their care untarnished, it would be the aim of the order to keep it untarnished.

MRS. Berry responded gracefully for the Rebekahs, giving thanks for the wonderful reception and expressing the belief that much of value to the order would come from the Las Vegas convention.

Ed C. Mulcahy, grand representative, delivered the formal address of the meeting. He stated that the eyes of the entire state were turned toward Las Vegas because they realize in a large measure that here lies the future of our state.

"When word of the success of Boulder dam legislation was received, we of the north were happy in your happiness," he said. "The distance between the north and south used to be great, but now the magnificent highways are bringing us closer together. It used to be, perhaps, that some of our candidates came to you every two years and told you what wonderful fellows you are. Now we are proud of your achievements. You will continue to grow and we will help you to grow."
