(By the Associated Press) Political fences he has not tended to since he last campaigned over the state likely will begin to get some attention soon from Governor Balzar. The governor has in mind a journey to Las Vegas in the near future and another into the region around Winnemucca. Later on, in September, when the board of highway commissioners, of which the governor is a member, makes its annual tour of the state's road system he will have further opportunity to improve his position.

For the first time in many weeks Governor Balzar, State Engineer George W. Malone and Chairman J. F. Shaughnessy of the public service commission are all at their desks at one time. The pressure of business has taken each at various times away from the capital.

Incidentally, the governor has not yet announced the reappointment of either Malone or Shaughnessy, although their commissions have long since expired. Unless he has other plans he is expected to do so shortly.

Chief Justice Benjamin W. Coleman of the supreme court, who has been in San Francisco recovering from an attack of hay fever, is expected to return early next week and resume his judicial duties.

"Nevada Days" at the 49 celebration at Placerville, Cal., probably will be featured by the attendance of Governor Balzar, who has indicated his willingness to be present either on June 27 or 28.

NEW MACHINE SPEEDS UP PHOTOS

PARIS, June 19 (AP)—The French Academy of Science viewed the world's fastest photography when an invention was recently demonstrated which showed moving pictures taken at 2,000 exposures a second.

The photographic invention was introduced by M. d'Arsonval, one of the members of the Institute, and was the invention of Professors Huguenard and Magnan. The cinematographic machine, which was not greatly different from an ordinary camera, showed clear pictures at a speed varying from 2,000 to 3,200 per second.

By a special process in exposure, together with the use of a revolving shutter, a film turning three meters per second produced 2,400 pictures. The luminous impressions being recorded at one six-thousandth of a second. With a larger film the inventors declare they can obtain ten thousand views per second.

The pictures were those of a large fly in action and also some small birds in flight, taken at close range. When the films were shown in reduced speed it was possible to measure the wing strokes of the fly as 90 per second. The movement of the birds were observed in the next minute detail.

The invention contributes valuable aid to scientific documentary film work and will be especially used in aeronautic research. Heretofore only 250 views were obtainable per second.

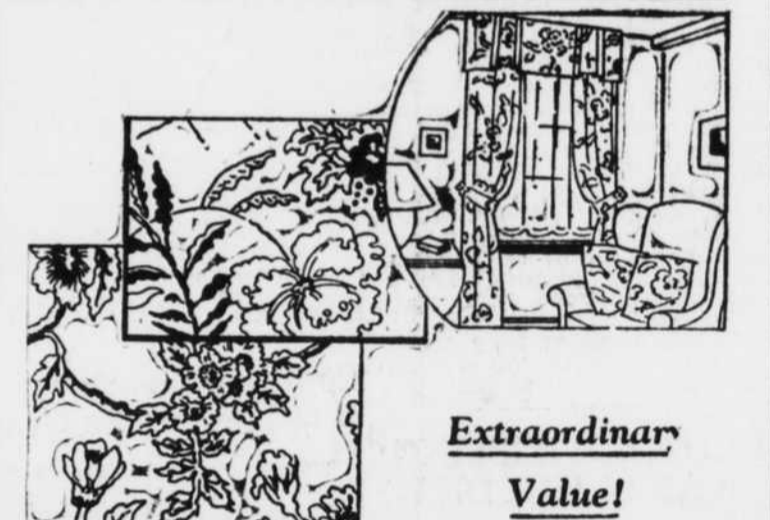

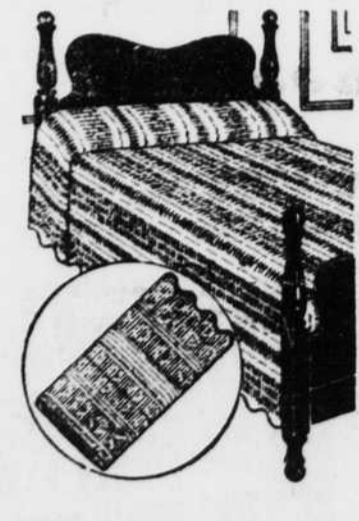
