Wallace & Headricks Have Shared Honors In Other Bouts

Clyde Headricks, hard punching Tonopah middleweight, and Mickey Wallace, pride of the local boxing fans, will wind up their training this afternoon for their ten-round clash tomorrow night.

Headricks and Wallace have met twice before. Wallace won a close ten round decision in one match and Headricks knocked Wallace out of the ring in the sixth round of their other meetings and was returned a winner by a technical knockout.

Mickey and Clyde will both be trying for a knockout and the fans will be treated to some dynamic punches when the bell rings to-morrow night.

Headricks has beaten Chick Roach, Billy Vincent, Joe Lines and other well known coast battlers. Dick Swartz, the fighting expression, and Battling Williams, a hard hitting colored boy, may steal the show from the main event.

WILLIAMS FAVORED

Williams, a classy boxer and a good straight puncher, will enter the ring a favorite over Swartz.

Young Thompson, local colored flash, clashes with Eddie Bradley of Ely in the second spot.

JUMPING JOE DEFEATS ABE

LOS ANGELES, June 24 (U.P.)—Joe Savoldi defeated Abe Coleman, New York heavyweight, two falls out of three, in a wrestling match at Olympic auditorium tonight.

Savoldi weighed 200 pounds and Coleman 202.

Joe took the first fall in 16 minutes, 32 seconds with a head scissors and arm lock. Coleman annexed the second in 14 minutes, 37 seconds with a head scissors, and Savoldi took the rubber fall in six minutes, 45 seconds with a flying tackle.

STRIB IS SEEN AS WINNER BY GENE

Former Champ Thinks Match Fairly Even, But Predicts Win

By L. S. CAMERON (United Press Sports Editor) COLUMBUS, OHIO, June 24.—(U.P.)—Gene Tunney believes that William Stribling will beat Max Schmeling and acquire the world's heavyweight championship, he told the United Press today while en route to Columbus to witness the Ryder Cup golf matches.

SEES GOOD BOUT

Tunney, who retired as the undefeated champion, believes the July 3 title bout "will be a great one."

"That's why I plan to see it," he said. "The principals are evenly matched, but I believe Stribling has the better chance of victory."

"Oh, I'd love to see Schmeling win, but I think Stribling is going to."

Tunney was asked what he regarded as Stribling's best weapon. "His left hook. He has a great one. It is fast. Besides, Stribling is the faster in any department of boxing."

DETERMINATION

"Schmeling's other great asset is his dogged determination."

Tunney said he did not regard the length of the fight—15 rounds—as of special advantage to either. "But it might aid Stribling," he said, "because Schmeling has been relatively inactive as far as actual boxing is concerned, for the last two years."

Tunney has seen Schmeling fight once—his unsatisfactory engagement with Jack Sharkey. He has seen Stribling in several fights, among them the second one with Carnera in Paris.

ROBINS ADVANCE AMONG NATIONAL

EBBETS FIELD, BROOKLYN, N. Y., June 24.—(U.P.)—The Brooklyn Robins advanced into the first division of the National League pennant race today, winning two games from the Pittsburgh Pirates, 6 to 4 and 5 to 3.

The victories boosted Brooklyn's percentage to over the 500 mark for the first time this season.

Joe Shaute held the Pirates in check in the first game, registering his seventh victory as his mates, led by O'Doul and Wright, pounded French.

RUFFING PITCHES YANKEES TO WIN

CHICAGO, June 24.—(U.P.)—Charley Ruffing hurled the New York Yankees to their third straight victory over the Chicago White Sox, 10 to 3, today.

The White Sox scored their runs on four hits in the final inning to prevent Ruffing from scoring a shut-out. Up to the ninth frame, the big right-hander allowed Chicago but four hits.

Babe Ruth's 15th home run of the season in the third inning sent the Yanks in the lead. Three successive singles, by Chapman, Sewell and Lazzari, in the fourth, enabled the Yanks to score two runs, while four hits in the sixth frame, including doubles by Sewell and Perkins and Lazzari's triple, produced four runs. Two hits in each of the seventh and eighth innings scored two and one run respectively.

The Cardinals won the first game also by a score of 4 to 2.
