He thanked the local officials for their aid and, within a few minutes, the plane was dashing down the runway and the flight had started. The sun was just breaking through the early morning haze and a moderate westerly wind was blowing as they departed.
The heavy load taxed the capacity of the plane, which at one time appeared to be likely to crash at the end of the runway, but finally lifted clear and slowly climbed to a good altitude.
The fliers said they hoped to reach Copenhagen within 22 hours, but that weather conditions might delay them. They did not carry a radio.

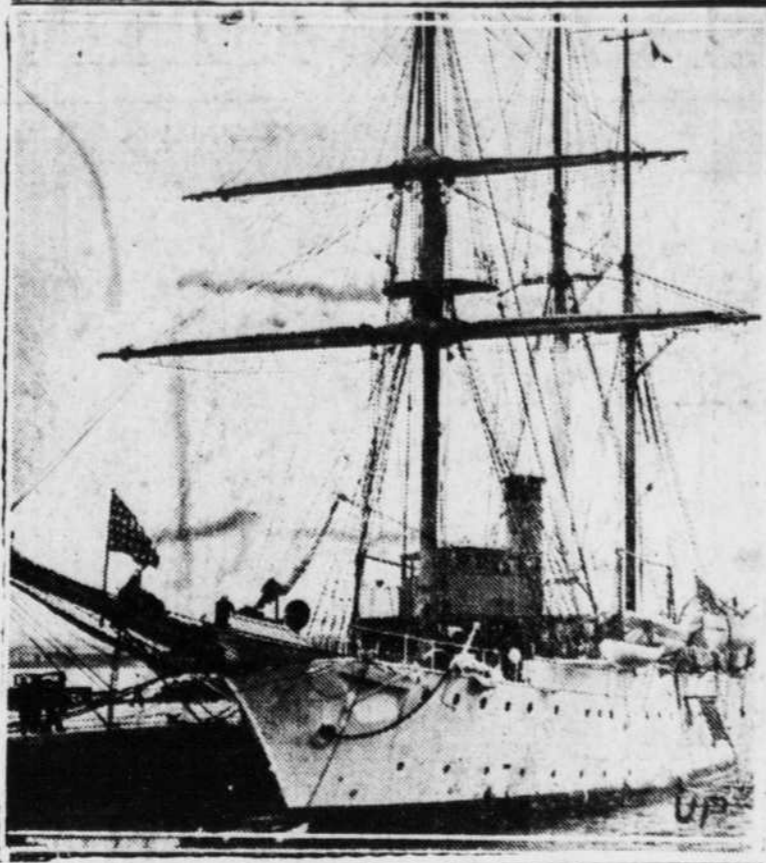

Gunboat of Spanish-American War Days Junked

SAN DIEGO, Cal., June 22 (AP)—Her sails used for the last time in bringing her here, the old gunboat Newport today is being towed to Bremerton, Wash., navy yard for dismantling. Plenty of white paint on the battered iron hull has spared the barkentine from showing her age. She was built in 1897 with the Annapolis, Vicksburg and Princeton, ships long since vanished from the seas.
Except for her engine, the Newport retains few relics of her halcyon days, chief among them being a pair of old-fashioned cutlasses with huge hand guards.
The Newport, until recently used as a training ship in the merchant marine academy, is to be replaced by the U. S. S. Brosvon, now undergoing repairs in Puget Sound. Capt. J. H. Tomb, commanding the merchant marine academy, said, in discussing the abandonment of the Newport:
"We haven't time for sails any more. We must teach our young men too many things in addition to seamanship, to bother with sails, which have no part in modern navigation. The Newport, one of the few coal-burning gunboats left, was built in a day when sailors considered it suicidal to put to sea without sails, to use in case engines failed, a propeller dropped off or the supply of coal ran out."
