ROYAL LOVE COURSE MADE SMOOTH FOR SWEDISH MAID AND HER PRINCE

By ULRICH SALCHOW STOCKHOLM, June 20. (AP)—Not since the time of Karin Mansdotter, in the 15th century, has a member of Swedish royalty married a commoner.

That was some 400 years ago and so plenty of excitement was caused in Sweden by the engagement of Prince Lennart, nephew of King Gustav, to another Karin, surnamed Nissvandt.

This sensation was quickly followed by another. King Gustav refused to give his consent. This attitude only called forth a declaration from Lennart that he intended to marry Miss Nissvandt anyway.

A formal breach with his royal relative seemed unavoidable until King Gustav explained that his opposition was only because he thought the young couple should wait another year. The prince was only 22 on May 8 and Miss Nissvandt will be only 20 on July 7. "No hurry," was all King Gustav meant. So the wedding is set for May, 1932.

Prince Lennart met with deep and warm understanding from his parents, Prince Wilhelm and Princess Maria. They are divorced and she is living in New York. Prince Wilhelm toured the United States in 1928 lecturing on adventures in Africa.

It may be that the law will deprive Lennart of his right to inherit the Swedish throne. But he would hardly worry! There are many other princes in front of him, and a throne is none too attractive these days.

There is nothing like love at first sight in this story. The young people knew each other as children when Prince Wilhelm had a country seat, "Stenhammar," and was a neighbor of the Karin family.

The young people were playmates and for years they preferred each other's company. The "pair-horses" they were called years ago—mostly by people who had little idea of the real truth in the words.

Prince Lennart's mother, Princess Maria of Russia, left Sweden when her son was only five years old. His father was absent for long periods of service in the navy and he was without a real home. But his grandmother, the late Queen Victoria, too a fancy to the young prince and became a true foster mother.



Prince Lennart of Sweden and Karin Nissvandt, daughter of a commoner, were childhood sweethearts but announcement of their betrothal almost caused a rift in the Swedish royal family. That has been smoothed out and they will wed next year.

From her he inherited by will the old castle on an island in the Bodens sea to which he will take Karin as his bride. It is called "Mainau" and is about 400 years old. It contains a gallery of rare art and much valuable furniture.

An estate of several thousand acres surrounds the castle and it was in view of his future possession of this country seat that Prince Lennart has studied agriculture for the past two years.

The personal jewelry of Queen Victoria, which he would also have inherited if he had married a princess, will go to other members of the royal family.

But friends of Karin Nissvandt say she probably will not miss the diamonds and pearls when she gets her prince.
