BOULDER WORKER LOSES HIS FINGER

Catching his finger on a cable in taking it off the hoist drum, Earmy Stokes, an employe of Six Companies, yesterday morning severed his right index finger at the second joint.

Stokes was working on the Arizona side of the Colorado river.

4 tablespoons lemon juice
4 cups sugar
Mix ingredients. Boil slowly and stir frequently until mixture thickens. Pour into sterilized jars and, when cool, seal.

Fresh Vegetable Salad Mold (Serving Six)
1 package lemon flavored gelatin mixture
2 cups boiling water
1 cup diced cucumbers
1 cup diced celery
1/2 cup diced tomatoes (fresh)
2 tablespoons finely chopped onions
2 tablespoons finely chopped green peppers
1 teaspoon salt
Pour water over gelatin mixture and stir until dissolved. Cool. Add rest of ingredients and pour into glass mold. Chill until stiff. Unmold on lettuce and surround with mayonnaise.

Cherry Mousse
1 tablespoon granulated gelatin
3 tablespoons cold water
3 cups seeded red cherries
33 cups whipped cream
1/2 cups sugar
2 teaspoons vanilla
1/2 teaspoon almond extract
1/2 teaspoon lemon extract
Mix cream, sugar and extracts. Soak gelatin and water five minutes. Dissolve over pan of hot water. Cool. Mix gelatin, cream mixture and cherries. Pour into tray in mechanical refrigerator and freeze four hours.

This dessert can be frozen by packing in mold and burying four hours in three parts chopped ice to one part coarse salt.
