U. S. WOMAN IS OUSTED FROM NET MEET

WIMBLEDON, Eng., June 27 (U.P.)—America's hopes in the women's singles of the Wimbledon tennis championships were dealt a severe blow today when Mrs. Lawrence A. Harper of California, first ranking woman player of that country, was eliminated by Miss Betty Nuthall, buxom British star, 6-4, 6-2.

Miss Nuthall's victory, while a disappointment to Americans, was not a surprise, for the English girl, with the exception of Mrs. Helen Wills Moody is without a peer. She proved her superiority over Mrs. Harper by defeating the Californian in the finals of the American championship last year.

The United States still has a chance for the women's title, however, as Miss Helen Jacobs, another Californian and ranked No. 2 in 1928 and 1929, went into the quarter-final round with a clean-cut victory over Mrs. L. A. Godfree of England.

While many of the American triumphs were by one-sided margins, the play was truly as intense as the broiling sun that beat down on Scioto's hard baked terrain.

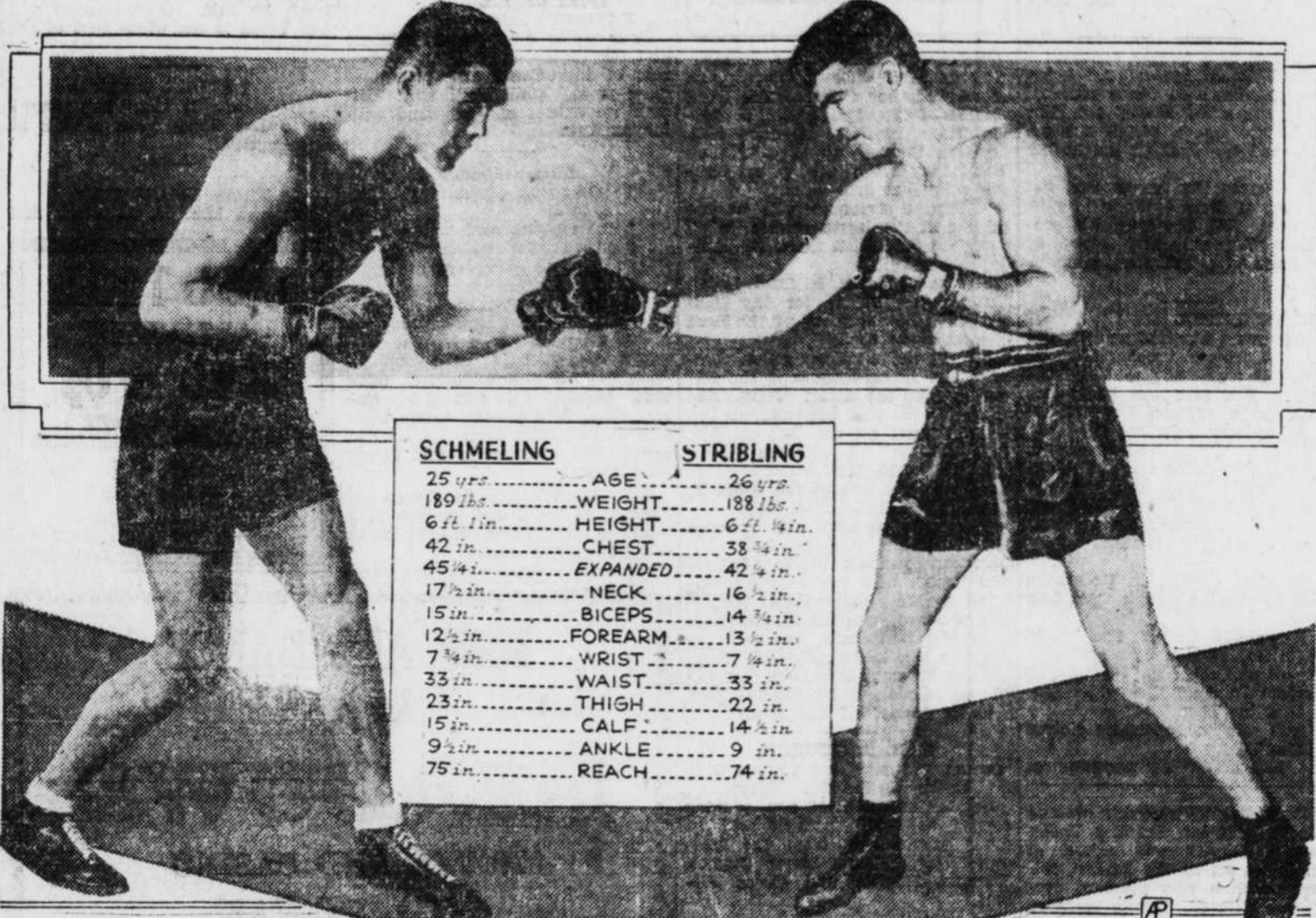
