RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. Water rates shall be due and payable on the first day of each month for water furnished during the previous month, and shall be delinquent on the 15th. 2. Where two or more services supply the same premises or consumer, each will be rated as a separate service. 3. Water rates or charges will be charged for all services which the premises are occupied or not until supply shall be, in writing, ordered shut off. 4. All water rates and charges shall be charged against the property on which it is furnished, and against the owner thereof, and no charge of ownership or occupancy will affect the application of this rule. 5. When water is turned off for vacancy a written order will be required before again turning on. 6. The water reserves the right to shut off water without notice for the purpose of making repairs or extensions. 7. Bills will become delinquent on the 15th of each month and if not paid at the Company's office on or before that date 25c will be added for collection and delinquency, and a collector will call at the premises and receive payment, or leave final notice and a bill remains unpaid five days after date thereof the water will be shut off and will not be turned on again for the then occupant of the premises except on payment of the full amount due, and One dollar added thereto for collection, delinquency and turning on. 8. The rate for any service not herein specially enumerated, shall be fixed by the company. 9. Subject to the provisions of this grant and to the foregoing schedule of rates and charges the grantee herein, its successors and assigns, may make any and all rules and regulations subject to the approval of the Public Service Commission, as heretofore laid down, governing the use of water and to prevent any waste thereof by consumers during the life of this franchise. 10. No connection larger than three quarters of an inch (3/4") shall be made to said water mains unless special permission is obtained from such company, and for which said company shall make an additional charge of \$5.00 per month for each quarter inch that such connection shall be in excess of three-quarters of an inch.

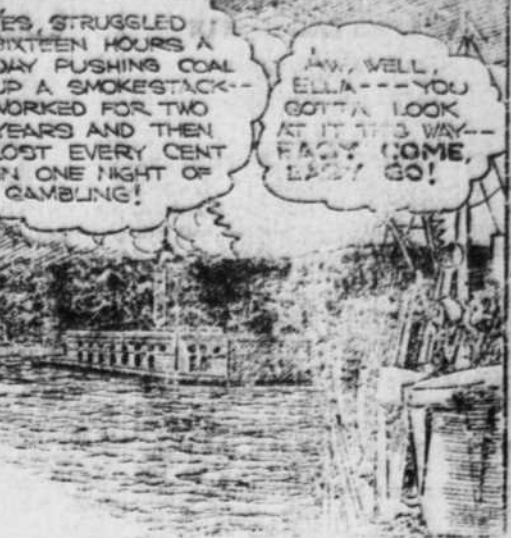
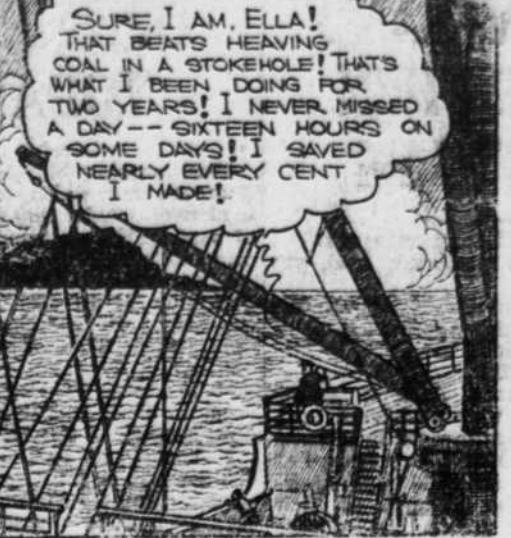

MARKETS AT A GLANCE

By RICHARD L. GRIDLEY (United Press Staff Correspondent) NEW YORK, June 29. (UP)—Absence of any fresh buying incentive in the war debt discussions and a desire on the part of traders to "cash in" on the large profits accumulated during the past week of rising prices, created an easier tone on the stock exchange today. Here and there, a few shares were able to move against the trend but the main body of stocks worked steadily lower on a dwindling volume of transactions through most of the session. Losses did not run much beyond seven points even in the volatile issues and the activity was too light to indicate any definite change in trend. Rather the easier tone was regarded as a natural sequel to the excited upbidding of stocks last week and a development making for improved technical conditions within the market itself. A weak long following had been attracted by the sensational uprush and it was thought that the market was entitled to a period of correction. This feeling pervaded the brokerage comment before the opening, which advised temporary lightening of accounts pending consolidation of the advance. Absence of important liquidation was afforded by the trading volume, which approximated 2,100,000 shares, against 3,100,000 shares Friday and the recent peak of 5,100,000 shares. The market got its cue at the opening from a 1 1/2 point drop in S&P common. Subsequent opening prices were similarly lower and the list worked steadily downward to the close. Leaders made fractional recoveries from their worst levels shortly before the finish. Group movements were not well defined and little attention was paid to favorable news. Strong spots were confined to issues in which important interests are involved. The Dow-Jones stock averages showed substantial losses in all classes of stocks. Industrials lost 4.26 points to 152.67; rails 2.03 points to 86.23, and utilities 1.64 points to 69.94. The market's indifference to constructive developments was illustrated by the copper shares. These issues, including American Smelting, Anaconda and Kennecott, acted tired, notwithstanding the fourth quarter-cent advance in copper prices in a week. Foreign purchases of the metal, which amounted to nearly 10,000,000 pounds, carried the price to 9 cents a pound for domestic delivery and 9.25 cents a pound for export shipment, compared with the recent lows of 8 and 8.25 cents a pound, respectively.
