

ANOTHER MAN QUIZZED IN SLAYING

FORT MORGAN, Colo., June 29—(U.P.)—John Grabbe, 19, of Wiggins was brought to jail here tonight for questioning in connection with the slaying of Enid Marriott.

Grabbe has been known as a former intimate friend of John Schopflin, 21-year-old confessed slayer of the school teacher whose body was found frozen in an irrigation ditch here last February, two months after she disappeared.

Sheriff Rufus Johnston of Fort Morgan refused to reveal the significance of the latest move in the case. He has held throughout that Schopflin, despite his early assertions after his confession at Stockton, Cal., that he alone was mixed in the crime, had aid. The sheriff refused to say whether Schopflin had changed his story, or whether the questioning of Grabbe was simply to clear up details in connection with Schopflin's confession.

PIOCHE YOUTH DIES IN UTAH

Burial will be at Pioche, but the date has not been set.

propeller. The blade, they said, was in bad shape.

Other mechanics went over the motor and said it appeared to be in perfect condition.

GATTY HURT
NOME, Alaska, June 29 (U.P.)—Harold Gatty, who, with Wiley Post, is making an attempt to fly around the world in 10 days, was injured at the Solomon air field this afternoon when the propeller of their globe circling plane, the Winnie Mae, struck him on the shoulder.

He refused to take the slight injury seriously, however, and with Post hopped off for Fairbanks at 5:45 p.m. Nome time. (11:45 p.m. E.S.T.)

The plane landed at the Solomon field at 3 p.m. (9 p.m. E.S.T.) and the fliers announced they would take off for Fairbanks at 5:45, as soon as they could refuel the plane. The refueling was completed in a short time but they had difficulty taking off due to the condition of the runway and the heavy gasoline load.

PLAN LONG HOP
The fliers said they planned to sleep a few hours at Fairbanks and then take off on a hop which will land them as close to New York as possible. They said if their fuel supply proves adequate they will eliminate their proposed stop at Edmonton, Alberta. They hope to reach Cleveland in their next jump.

Both men were fresh and said they were not very tired despite the 2400 mile flight from Khabarovsk, Siberia. Their time for that flight was 17 hours.

When the fliers landed in Alaska, they had completed approximately 11,600 miles of their projected round the world flight, which started in New York at 3:56 a.m. Tuesday, June 23, and it appeared certain now that barring accidents they will complete the globe circling flight in ten days.

AVERAGE 139 M. P. H.
They averaged approximately 139 miles an hour on the long sea hop across the Kamchatkan peninsula and the North Pacific.

The hop to Fairbanks will be comparatively short for the Australian and the American, who have broken all records for globe circling to this point. Fairbanks is about 520 miles each of Nome on an airline and the fliers hoped to reach the interior city before 7 p.m.

Nome was literally agog when the fliers arrived. For several hours practically the entire population had patrolled the beach watching for sight of the Winnie Mae. For several hours there was considerable anxiety when a heavy fog enshrouded the region and extended for miles out into the Behring Strait.

An hour before they arrived, however, the weather cleared and visibility extended to 10 miles when the tiny speck which proved to be Winnie Mae was visible out over the strait.

HAVE AIR ESCORT
The convoy of Alaskan planes took the air as soon as the Winnie Mae was sighted and when Post and Gatty arrived, signalled the fliers to follow, which they did after circling Nome and giving residents the biggest thrill they have had since Amundsen and Noble flew over in their dirigible several years ago.

It was believed that the fliers would hesitate there no longer than necessary but considerable surprise was created when they announced that they would take off immediately. The force gathered at the landing field took charge of the refueling while the airmen ate food which had been prepared for them. The refueling was finished quickly and just 32 minutes after they landed here they were on their way to Fairbanks.

The aviators had crossed two continents and two oceans when they landed here. Remaining after Fairbanks were only two stops, one at Edmonton, Alberta, and one at Cleveland, Ohio, if all goes well. Originally Post and Gatty planned to make the Edmonton hop direct from here but when they landed so early in the day they decided to put some more distance behind them before they stopped for a rest.

IN AIR 18 HOURS
They were in the air exactly 18 hours when they landed here, and it was considered likely that they would rest several hours before taking off from Fairbanks.
