TOPSY-TURVY, UPSIDE DOWN POSITION MEANS NAUGHT TO JACQUES HE INTRODUCES NEW ART FORM

By FREDERICK C. OTHMAN United Press Staff Correspondent CHICAGO, Jan. 2. (U.P.)—The distinguished artist, Loufit Jacques, turned the local art world topsy-turvy today when he hung his upside-down, right-side-up, left-side sideways pictures in a salon at the Seneca hotel.

He brought down the wrath of the conservatives for his "flibbertigibbiness" and received the acclaim of the ultra-mocernists for his "far seeing, artistic revolution."

And he made the going tough, incidentally, for those residents of the hospitality who wandered in late with hangers from New Year's eve parties. They stopped, stared, scratched their heads, and fled precipitately from the scene, which consisted of the dapper Jacques demonstrating how his pictures turned on pivots and how they looked just as well upside down as right side up, and certainly no worse with the left side the other way around.

"You don't find anything familiar in my pictures," explained Jacques, whose previous, more conservative works have been known the country over for years. "You wonder what they're all about. They're not telling a story, they're just combinations of color notes which should thrill you."

Jacques whirled his principal picture, entitled "Carnival," on its pivot, to show how sometimes its spots of blue and red and green and yellow and all the other shades sometimes swept up and sometimes swept down or sideways, but swept "beautifully and artistically" in any event. "I have combined some colors here," said he. "When the picture's upside down, there's a girl in it who's right-side up, but she just happened to be there. I didn't paint her in on purpose." Jacques twisted the picture again, showing a strange looking dog, which also "just happened" to be among the blobs of color on the circular canvas. Another twirl and there appeared a minstrel dancer, with arms akimbo.

"The figures are all there," said

Jacques, "except that they're not. You just see them because you're used to looking for representations of nature in all paintings. But that's all wrong. Paintings are like music. The best music attempts to tell no story. Neither do my best paintings. They're just there to make you think and for you to enjoy, if you can."

Conservative art critics frowned so blackly upon Jacques' paintings that they refused to be quoted. "Terrible," said they. "Awful." "Too insane for words." The moderns took the opposite stand. "Beautiful," said they. "Wonderful." "Too lovely for words."

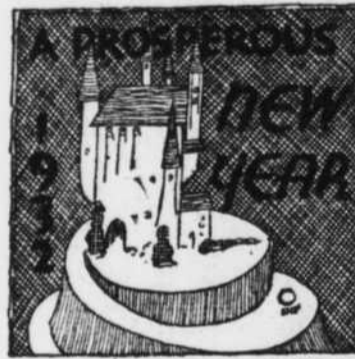
