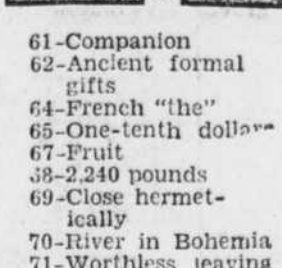

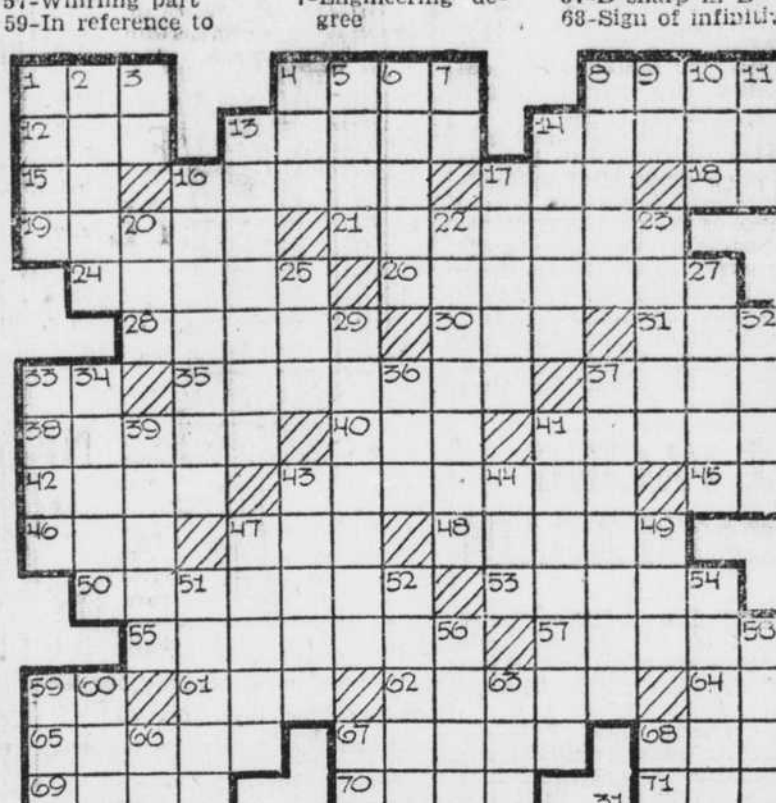

SOUTHERN S. P. MEN ACCEPT CUT

NEW YORK, Jan. 4 (U.P.)—Approximately one-half of the personnel of the Southern Pacific lines in Texas and Louisiana, comprising about 8,000 employees, have voted to accept a voluntary ten per cent reduction in wages. A. D. McDonald, president of the Texas and New Orleans Railroad Co., announced today.

Agreement to institute the wage cut, effective January 1, 1932, was reached at a recent series of conferences with representatives of various shop erants and union representatives, officers of the road, which is operated as a Southern Pacific subsidiary, have voted also to accept a salary cut.

MARKETS AT A GLANCE

NEW YORK, Jan. 4 (U.P.)—Financial markets continued in a gloomy mood today, the first full session of the new year, with most speculative leaders drifting to new bear market lows.

About the only point of comfort for the bull forces was the relatively light turnover, which approximated 1,500,000 shares. The decline was slow and orderly and in few instances were there signs of distress liquidation.

The bad feeling in speculative quarters, however, spread to the bond market to which traders look for the first signs of recovery. Cotton slumped sharply after its protracted holiday and grains were weak.

Selling in stocks converged on such leaders as United States Steel, American Telephone, General Motors, General Electric, American Can, Du Pont and Westinghouse Electric, all of which reached new minimum prices. Auburn broke nearly ten points and recovered part of its loss, while the highly speculative J. I. Case shares were seven points on unexplained selling from mid-western sources.

Elsewhere, changes were small and of little significance. Peoples Gas broke sharply and Goodyear lost more than three points on reduction of its dividend from \$3 to \$1 annually. Pressure increased on the railroad issues, which had previously displayed considerable resistance.

Oil as a group were only slightly lower, although Standard Oil of New Jersey at one time equaled its low of the bear market.

The market had little to add in outside developments. President Hoover's special message to congress urging speed in necessary legislation was read with interest but had little influence on price movements.

Indications of further progress in the reconstruction finance corporation proposal to thaw out frozen bank credits and aid railroads, likewise, had little effect on the market although it was construed bullishly.

On the bond market some capital was made of the remarks of Undersecretary of State Castle that the government's purpose is to protect "so far as possible" America's financial stake abroad. This statement brought considerable support into the recently hard pressed foreign loans. Railroad bonds, however, were weak, influenced in part by the decision of the St. Louis-San Francisco in foregoing payment of state taxes in order to satisfy bond creditors.

Fears over a reduction of the current \$10 annual dividend of Atchafalaya at the directors' meeting tomorrow caused some selling of this and other high-grade rail issues like New York Central and Union Pacific. Pennsylvania, however, held firm on light trading.

Feature of the session in stocks, however, was the heavy overflow of selling in General Motors, which broke below 20 for the first time the present shares were listed. Offerings of the stock came from all sections of the country and were partly influenced by unconfirmed rumors of a gigantic merger in the industry to give it more effective competition.

Mid-west reports said the merger would include Nash, making medium priced cars, Hudson and Essex with low priced units and Packard with high-priced models.

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 4 (U.P.)—Slow trading caused sheep, cattle and hogs to sell weak to slightly slower today on the Kansas City livestock market.

Steers and yearlings sold from \$4.20 to \$7.50. Top fat hogs brought \$4.20 and the bulk of sales ranged from \$4 to \$4.15. Best lambs sold from \$5 to \$5.90.
