NEW DELHI, India, Jan. 5. (UP)—The government of India, guided by the unyielding stand of the Viceroy Lord Lillingdon, emerged victorious tonight from the first clash with Indian nationalists, preparing for resumption of civil disobedience against British rule.

By RICHARD L. GRIDLEY (United Press Financial Writer) NEW YORK, Jan. 5. (UP)—Action of the stock market was considerably improved today although news developments continued to strongly favor the bear side.

Stocks received little aid from the bond market where another flood of selling sent United States government issues into lower ground.

Deals in stocks showed further contraction as speculative interest dwindled and price movements, except in isolated instances, were extremely narrow.

The brokerage suspension of Gurnett & Co. brought sharp breaks in shares in which the house was interested and somewhat explained the source of the selling in the pre-market.

One story in the street was that "Big Bill" Danforth, bear leader of the 1929-1930 campaign, did most of his business through the Boston office of Gurnett & Co. and was currently carrying a considerable long stock in J. I. Case.

Both American Smelting and Atchison broke to new lows for the bear market or longer on the dividend reductions and fears of similar action continued to have their effect on American Telephone.
