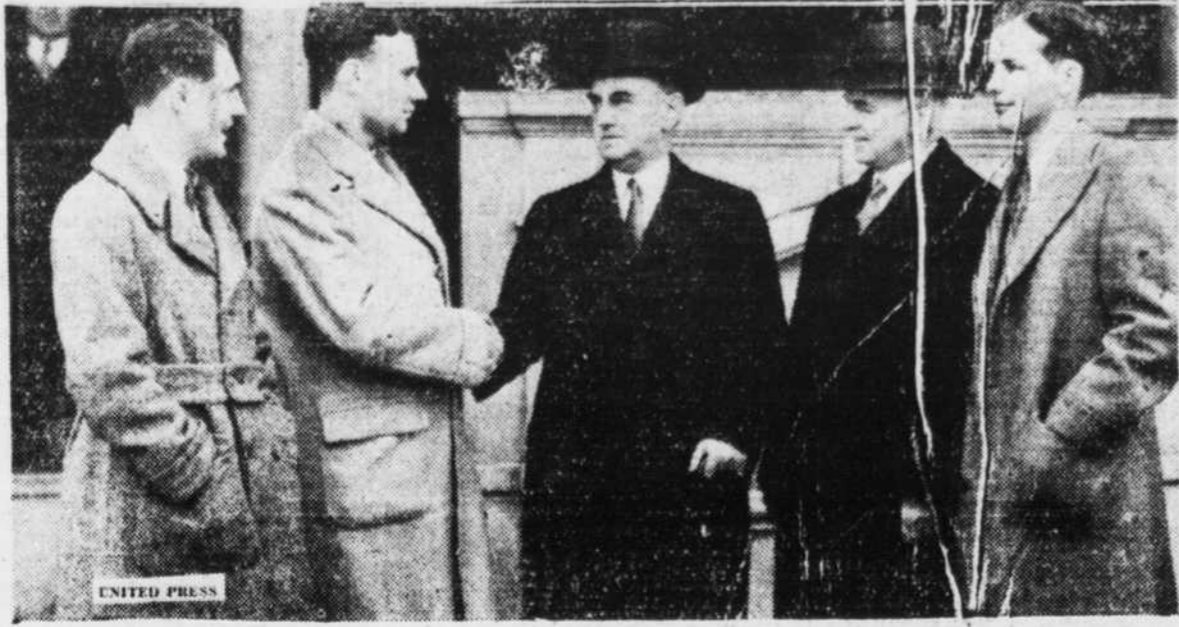


CRUISING DEBATERS GET ROYAL WELCOME

SCREEN LIFE IN HOLLYWOOD

HOLLYWOOD — Release dates are dates that must be kept and Hollywood is getting tired of keeping them.

A picture must be completed and ready to be shown on a certain date, under this system, regardless of its quality. The story may have holes in it that the makers would remedy, but the release date pops up and nothing can be done.

Only one major organization, Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, has been able to convince its sales department that the bugaboo should be wiped out.

It is not improbable that, within a year, the bane of the industry—the deadline—will be almost entirely done away with. Producers are beginning to agree that it has been responsible for a terrible mess of poor pictures.

INTO THE LEGIT

The top of legitimate plays getting under way here is giving employment to a dozen or more "screen names" who are either "between pictures" or just waiting.

Opening scene will be "The Last of Mrs. Cheever," with Bob Daniels in her local stage debut, "Grand Hotel," with Olga Belanova, Dorothy Tree and Ian Klieh, and "Lysistrata," with Nance O'Neil, occasionally seen in films, featured.

A striking case is that of Helen Hayes' first, "The Sin of Madelon Claudet." Made as "Lullaby," it drew adverse comment from everyone, even the principals. Nearly half of it was retaken, the title changed and it became an excellent picture.

To meet release dates most productions are thrown together—willy-nilly. Selection of players and director often is guided more by availability than by fitness.

CHICAGO, Jan. 6. (U.P.)—Three bandits removed pants and shirt from Aaron Goldman in his office on the eighth floor of a loop skyscraper today. Then they tore his clothes in shreds, bound him with the resultant strips of cloth, and fled with \$200 in cash.

Goldman wrenched himself free and dashed after them, clad only in his union suit. He ran down eight flights of stairs and out through the lobby into Dearborn street, shouting "Help, murder, police," while startled pedestrians gazed upon his pantslessness.

Two of the robbers escaped with the money. One, identified as Angelo Centenne, 25, ran into the arms of a traffic policeman. Goldman went back to his office, hibernating and disconsolate, while police sought his money and his stenographer sought another pair of trousers.
