BANKS BORROW FIFTY MILLIONS

NEW YORK, Jan. 5. (U.P.) - The National Credit corporation is believed to have made loans totaling approximately \$50,000,000 to banks throughout the country since its organization about two months ago.

The corporation has called upon 10 per cent of their subscriptions on or before January 7, it was announced today at the national headquarters here.

Mortimer N. Buckner, president of the corporation, had previously announced that as a matter of policy no call for payments on subscriptions would be made until loans made amounted to about 10 per cent of subscriptions, when that amount would be requested. Loans during that time would be financed he stated, through borrowings from large banking institutions in New York and elsewhere.

It was stated at the offices of the corporation here that the funds received would be used to repay such borrowings from large banks and the process repeated until an-


