

HEAVYWEIGHT GO ASSURED MIAMI ON FEB. 26

Schmeling-Walker To Sign Contracts For Title Match Today

NEW YORK, Jan. 6. (AP)—Any hopes Chicago, Los Angeles and New York entertained of playing host to the world's heavyweight championship match between Max Schmeling and Mickey Walker, were dissipated today with the announcement that contracts calling for the bout at Miami, Fla., Feb. 26, will be signed tomorrow.

Joe Jacobs, manager of the German champion, and Jack Kearns, representing Walker, already have agreed on all details of distance, site, and finances, and the actual public signing, scheduled at Madison Square garden for 3 p. m. tomorrow, is a mere formality.

The bout will be over the 15-round route at Madison Square garden arena in Miami and will be promoted jointly by the Madison Square garden corporations of Florida and Illinois. Schmeling will receive 45 per cent of the net receipts, with Walker accepting 17 1/2 per cent. George Blake of Los Angeles is expected to be named as referee.

In signing, both fighters will grant Madison Square garden exclusive call on their services for a second championship bout in June. Walker names no opponents for the June bout, while Schmeling's agreement specifies Jack Dempsey

as an opponent with Jack Sharkey as an alternate if Dempsey refuses to post a forfeit to guarantee that he will fight this year.

"Championship" fights are barred under the Florida law but Madison Square garden has received assurances from Lou MacReynolds, Miami's one-man athletic commission, that there will be no interference with the bout.

The garden previously staged an American championship bout between Jack Sharkey and Young Stribling at Miami in 1929, and with Schmeling still refused recognition as champion in New York. MacReynolds believes there will be no opposition to the Schmeling-Walker match.

A last-minute attempt by garden officials and Jack Kearns to switch the match to New York was blocked by Schmeling's manager, who insisted that the bout be staged in Miami.

"Regardless of what anyone says, I am confident we will draw more than \$300,000 at Miami," said Jacobs. "I'm not even considering New York. In the first place neither Max nor I is licensed there. Anyway, the garden, seating only 18,000, is too small for a championship fight."

The Walker fight will be Schmeling's second defense of the title which he won on a foul from Jack Sharkey in 1929. The champion successfully defended his title by a 15-round knockout of Young Stribling at Cleveland last July.

Walker won recognition as a contender last fall when he relinquished his middleweight championship and fought a draw with Sharkey for the American heavyweight championship. The referee and many ringside critics credited Walker with winning eleven of the fifteen rounds, and while many other critics believed Sharkey was entitled to the verdict, the draw decision enabled Manager Kearns to build up Walker as a title contender.

NEW YORK, Jan. 6. (AP)—Tommy Hitchcock remains in a class by himself as America's only ten-goal player.

Walker, a blown-up, shop-worn middleweight, has any chance of victory against Schmeling, but, with Jack Kearns and Jimmy Johnston, Madison Square garden boxing director, cooperating in the ballyhoo, the bout is likely to be "steamed up" into a major attraction.

TO LOSE WEIGHT FOR N. Y. BOUT

HARTFORD, Conn., Jan. 6. (AP)—Bat Battalino is paying the price of holding the world's featherweight boxing championship.

In making 126 pounds for his 15-round bout against Lew Feldman of New York at Madison Square garden Friday, Battalino is risking whatever "oil" nature may demand in future years.

Starting just ten days ago, weighing 140 pounds, Bat had to undergo virtual tortures to come down to the weight. He was denied proper nourishment by the weight-making prescriptions. No regular meals, but a diet on which none but the hardy could exist is his measure.

There is a frugal breakfast of two eggs, one slice of toast and a cup of tea. No lunch and no drinks between meals. For dinner, a cup of blood squeezed from a slab of beef, a steak chopped to bits and eaten raw, another cup of tea and two slices of bread.

That's Bat's daily food just now as he is completing his work for Friday's bout. It has had the desired result. Bat went to work this afternoon weighing close to 130 pounds. Six fast rounds on the light bag, three rounds of rope skipping, a round on the pulleys and two at shadow boxing were included in the workout.

BANKS BORROW FIFTY MILLIONS

NEW YORK, Jan. 5. (AP)—The National Credit corporation is believed to have made loans totaling approximately \$50,000,000 to banks throughout the country since its organization about two months ago.

The corporation has called upon banks which subscribed to about \$500,000,000 of its gold notes to pay 10 per cent of their subscriptions on or before January 7. It was announced today at the national headquarters here.

Mortimer N. Buckner, president of the corporation, had previously announced that as a matter of policy no call for payments on subscriptions would be made until loans made amounted to about 10 per cent of subscriptions, when that amount would be requested. Loans during that time would be financed he stated, through borrowings from large banking institutions in New York and elsewhere.

It was stated at the offices of the corporation here that the funds received would be used to repay such borrowings from large banks and the process repeated until another 10 per cent was required.

WIENER OPENS HIS NEW SHOP

Opening for business today at their new location at 116 Fremont street, the Louis Wiener company, merchant tailors, recently effected a move from their former establishment in the Delkin building.

STATE TREASURY DISBURSES SIX MILLION IN 1931

CARSON CITY, Jan. 6. (AP)—The state treasurer announced today that his office has disbursed \$6,559,258.83 during 1931, and that the largest disbursement for any one month was \$977,212.28, in July.

Amounts disbursed in the other months were: January \$416,335.28; February, \$394,497.67; March, \$275,010.79; April, \$240,784.27; May, \$339,540.29; June, \$363,273.59; August, \$717,205.34; September, \$861,230.91; October, \$698,611.95; November, \$631,536.15; December, \$544,020.19.

RAILROAD ASKS TO CLOSE AGENCY

CARSON CITY, Jan. 6. (AP)—The Public Service commission will hold hearings here January 13 on applications by the Southern Pacific company to abandon its agency stations in Schurz, Wadsworth and Oronia. Each application has met with strenuous opposition on the part of the community involved.

On January 12 the commission will hear the application of the Virginia and Truckee Transit company for permission to place its bus service between Gardnerville and Hawthorne and between Reno and Virginia City on a tri-weekly basis. They are on a six-day basis now.
