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TRAITOR MONEY

AN EDITORIAL in the Ladies' Home Journal refers to hoarded money as "Traitor money," because it has delayed the return of prosperity. Hoarded money may easily be misplaced, lost or stolen. It draws no interest. It creates no enterprise. It gives no one a job.

Keeping money safe—safely invested or safely busy in a building or a business enterprise does well for both the owner and for others without in anywise imperiling it. The fact that many have been hit by the collapse of the stock speculation craze does not change the fact that wise investments made now in real estate, buildings and business enterprises are not only safe but will inevitably lead to large profits as the country gradually recovers from its illness.
