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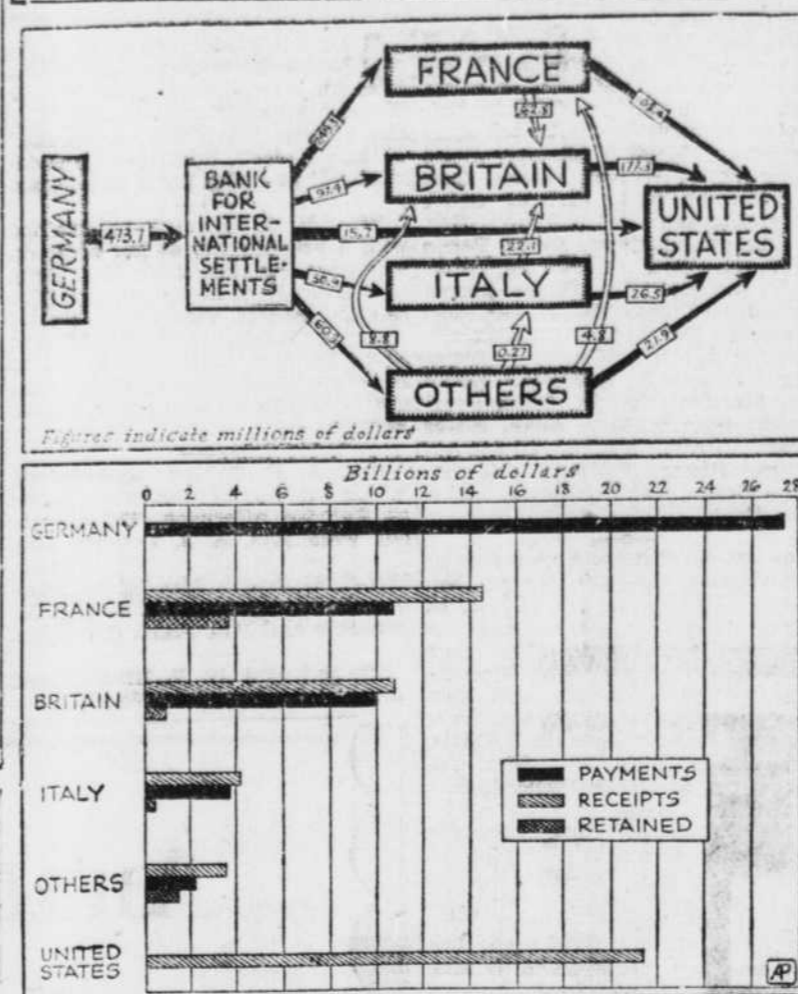

U. S. 'PAY UP' STAND OFF-STAGE FACTOR

By REID MONFORT. WASHINGTON, (P)—War debts and reparations—scabber marionettes against a backdrop of Versailles' Hall of Mirrors—again have moved to the center of the world's stage.

But the United States does not pull these strings. Upon any part she might play in the show is laid the definitely restraining hand of a congressional warning that revision or cancellation of debts due this country is out of the question as far as Congress is concerned.

At the close of the war some amount of German reparations at 100 billions, four times the sum called for by the existing schedule.

Reparations and debts have no connection officially recognized by the United States. The post-war policy of this government has been there is no relation between Germany's capacity to pay her creditors and the capacity of her creditors to pay the United States.

The Hoover moratorium, proposed last June, has halted the march of inter-governmental debts and reparations for at least a year, but while the President has proposed re-examination of the former, Congress has recorded its strong opposition to revision of the debts due the United States by foreign governments.

Germany has the right to declare a postponement of transfer of marks by the world bank into foreign currencies if it is shown that the Reichbank no longer can support transfers. The suspension of transfers may be for two years.
