HARRISBURG, Pa., Jan. 12. (U.P.) -Henry G. Brock, scion of a Philadelphia family, who wealthy served three years in the Eastern for second degree penitentiary murder, tonight became a member of the board of trustees of the institution, in which he served his sentence. Never discouraged by the prison

term, Brock, now 46 years old, regained his place in society through his interest in welfare work among former convicts and through his untiring efforts as a member of the board of prison inspectors for Philadelphia county.

Governor Pinchot named Brock to the prized post after carefully fearful one. reviewing his record and his welfare work. At the executive offices it was said that Brock was "well qualified and well fitted for the new position."
