MARKETS AT A GLANCE

NEW YORK, Jan. 13. (U.P.)—Security prices today reached their best levels since early December as federal reserve authorities completed plans for releasing almost unlimited credit resources into the market to stave off what it considers unwarranted deflation.

This program, designed to further its easy money policy, will involve pressure on member banks to purchase large amounts of bankers acceptances and United States government bonds, thereby setting loose so much credit now resting idly in bank vaults. The move took definite form last night when the New York reserve bank raised the price at which it will buy bankers acceptances.

News of the program caused advances in both stocks and bonds, most of the leading issues in each department reaching their best levels of the current movement. United States government issues, which have been weak recently on war debt repudiation fears, soared one to three points on prospects of heavy reserve bank purchases. Some traders said the market was being prepared for additional government financing.

The rise in stocks was little interrupted by realizing sales and prices reached their best levels near the close. Gains ranged up to half

a dozen points in the leaders and to more than ten points in a few more speculative issues.

News that the federal reserve authorities were determined to put a stop to the demoralizing sales of securities changed the stock market picture overnight. Whereas many traders held aloof in yesterday's session to await a test of the market's ability to hold recent advances, they quickly jumped on the buying side today, many bear traders being caught in the rush and forced to bid for stocks for covering purposes.

Traders were cheered by the credit news and said the stage was rapidly being set for workings of the and the railroad credit corporation, which are expected to get into operation before the end of the month to provide a variety of credit aid for business in general.

Other favorable developments in the news of the day from a stock market standpoint were indications that the 10 per cent wage reduction on railroads now being negotiated would be accepted by workers; unconfirmed reports that American short term credit now frozen in general would be extended in a few days and the highly constructive and long awaited Sinclair-Prairie Oil and Gas Prairie pipe line merger.

Best gains were made by stocks recently under most pressure. Auburn Auto bounded more than ten points on reports of general public acceptance of its new model; Steel common rose three points on reports its December business was better than revealed by its loss in unfilled orders during the month and American Telephone rose more than six points at one time despite fears of a dividend reduction later in the year. The regular payment of \$2.25, however, is expected at the next meeting.

Announcement of the Sinclair-Prairie merger caused a mild flurry in the petroleum shares and led to talk of further stabilization in the industry itself.

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 13. (U.P.)—Light receipts caused sheep to be 25 to 50 cents higher today on the Kansas City livestock market. Cattle and hogs remained unchanged, selling steady with Tuesday's close. Steers and yearlings sold from \$4.50 up to \$8.75. Top fat hogs brought \$4.10 and the bulk of sales ranged from \$3.85 to \$4.05. Lambs sold from \$3.50 to \$6.
