NEVADA LEGION RATED AMONG 'BIG 10'

Driving steadily forward under the leadership of Membership Officer Luke Henry, of Reno, in one of the greatest membership campaigns ever undertaken by the American Legion in this state, Nevada gained a place among the "big ten" according to word just received from national headquarters at Indianapolis. Nevada achieved a record of 50.67 per cent of its quota for this year with 702 registrations completed at the specified time, November 31, barely squeezing into tenth place ahead of West Virginia. The announcement terminated the first lap of a campaign that is to continue throughout the year.

Hawaii headed the list with 75.5 per cent, 1367 men enrolling. Great progress has been made by the Nevada department since handling in the report that placed it among the leading organizations. This week 968 members had enrolled. Reno heading the list with 251 signed up and Boulder City in undisputed possession of second place with 144 on the roster. Other Nevada posts in order of standing are McGill 83, Ely 53, Lovelock 52, Carson City 49, Elko 43, Winnemucca 42, Las Vegas, 41, Sparks, 34, Gardnerville 29, Wells 28, Caliente 26, Hawthorne 25, Fallon 21, Austin 21, Yerington 20, and Fernley 6.

FOUR REMAIN IN PRAYER CONTEST

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Jan. 15. (UP)—Out of 300 worshippers who began their "prayer marathon" in the Christ Reformed church, only four remained tonight after 36 hours of constant praying.

The four courageous contestants, praying for divine relief from the depression, are all young women, determined to remain in the race until the close of regular services tonight.

Catholics, Jews, Presbyterians, Baptists and other denominations were represented in the 300 who started praying yesterday morning. One of the leaders was a 60-year-old woman, and there were a number of men and children.

At noon today all but 50 had dropped out, hoarse and tired. 38 gave up the task in the next two hours, and at 6 p. m. the "congregation" had dwindled to four.

Song and special talks by the Rev. Luther A. Horn, evangelist who is conducting the meeting, helped to relieve the monotonous chanting through the night.

Many of the contestants remained awake by walking back and forth in the aisle. Some of the women wept hysterically. Others prayed silently.

The Rev. Horn has asked President Hoover to appoint a day for a national prayer demonstration.
