BRIGHT SPOTS IN BUSINESS

By United Press Aluminum Company of America receives contract for 3,000,000 pounds of aluminum panels for use in Radio City development. Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea Co. reports increase of 0.3 per cent in tonnage sales for five weeks ended January 2, 1932. Buick Motor Car Co. reports sales since introduction of 1932 models of 13,562 cars, substantial increase over corresponding season last year. Waldorf System, Inc., reports increase of 0.3 per cent in December sales. American Bureau of Metal Statistics reports production of refined lead of 37,607 tons, against 35,461 tons in November. Philip Morris and Co., Ltd., reports increase of 25 per cent in earnings during six months ended September 30, 1931.

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 15. (U.P.)—A firm tone, brought on by unusually light receipts, held cattle, hogs and sheep steady today on the Kansas City livestock market. Steers and yearlings sold from \$4.50 to \$7, with quality poor. Top fat hogs were \$3.90 and the bulk of sales ranged from \$3.75 to \$3.85. Lambs sold from \$5.75 to \$6.

MARKETS AT A GLANCE

By RICHARD L. GRIDLEY United Press Financial Writer NEW YORK, Jan. 15. (U.P.)—Easy money continued to buoy security markets today. Dealings in stocks showed a million share shrinkage from yesterday as large traders took profits but most of the leaders were able to better their previous closing levels. The advance continued on the bond market. United States government bonds were an exception to the trend reacting moderately after their recent sweeping gains. While the federal reserve condition statement for the week ended January 13 showed no indications of a credit expansion program, the street continued to believe that such a program had been adopted. The reserve bank was a heavy buyer of bankers' acceptances today, forcing the yield rate on the 60 and 90-day bills down 1/4 of one per cent. Simultaneously, call money softened and time money rates were reduced. This move by the reserve authorities to promote recovery by easy money drew sharp criticism from foreign financial centers, which concluded that the United States is embarking on a new "inflation era." Bankers here insist that such is not the case and that the move undertaken by the reserve banks is merely a "relaxation of bank credit" now resting in vaults and sorely needed by business and security markets. So far the move has been a powerful one in promoting recovery in the markets in the past few days and the street is more cheerful than it has been in many months. This feeling has led to quick formation of several pools to operate in special stocks. Some of these operations began

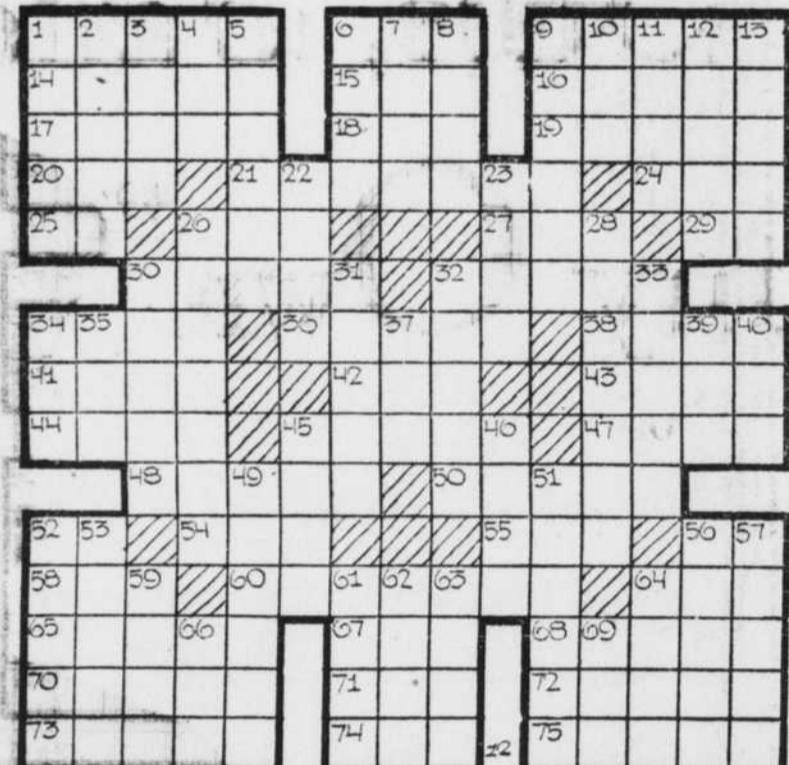

today, such favorites as J. I. Case, United Aircraft, United Corporation and Westinghouse Electric being bid up rapidly in the face of lethargy in many of the leaders. Two railroad favorites, New York Central and New Haven, were buoyant on buying attributed to a powerful group of eastern capitalists. Nothing new came out of the railroad wage conference at Chicago to affect speculative activity. Such leaders as United States Steel, General Electric, General Motors, American Can and DuPont held within narrow limits and closed within fractions of their previous closing levels. American Telephone, however, lost most of its recent buoyancy, selling off nearly 2 points. Considerable selling of stock went ahead yesterday on the strength of the statement by President Walter S. Gifford that Telephone's 1931 earnings covered the \$9 annual dividend by a small margin.
