STOUT HEARTED TOMMY FALLS BY WAYSIDE IN LAST BATTLE

Up-and-Comer Scores Technical KO In Second Round

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN NEW YORK, Jan. 15. (U.P.)—Steve Hamas, the former Penn State football star, forced his way to the front rank of the heavyweights tonight when he scored a technical knockout over Tommy Loughran of Philadelphia in the second round of a second ten round fight in Madison Square Garden.

A hard right to the chin a minute after the second round began floored the Philadelphia boxing master for a count of nine and before he could regain his composure, a volley of blows sent him to the canvas for another nine count. When he was down the third time under another series of rights and lefts, Referee Gunbert Smith stopped the battle.

For Hamas the knockout means a chance to meet the bigger men in his class. For Loughran, it appears to be the finish of one of the greatest careers boxing has ever known.
