MARKETS AT A GLANCE

By RICHARD L. GRIDLEY United Press Financial Writer NEW YORK, Jan. 19. (U.P.)—Traders deserted the stock market today and prices see-sawed monotonously throughout the session, finishing about where they left off yesterday. Turnover fell to 1,100,000 shares, the lowest since the day before Christmas. Similar lethargy took place in the bond market, but commodities like grains and cottons reacted sharply from their spurt over the week end. Principal unpredictable factors overhauling the market were the railroad wage discussions at Chicago; the clouded reparations and war debt situation; European attacks on the American dollar and the impending dividend meeting of the United States Steel corp. Because of the importance of the outcome of these uncertainties, traders were careful not to be caught overextended on either side of the market.

BRIGHT SPOTS IN BUSINESS

By United Press Bureau of labor statistics reports gain of 7 per cent in industrial employment during December; payrolls increase 3 per cent. Steel production in Chicago district increases 3 points to 23 per cent of capacity. Business failures last week totaled 751, according to Bradstreet's Domes Mines, Ltd. reports preliminary 1931 profit of \$1,690,824, against \$117,895 in 1930. Sharon Steel Corp. increases operations 12 points to 50 per cent of capacity. Associated Gas and Electric system reports increase of 8.5 per cent per customer in 1931 power output. Virginia Iron, Coal and Coke Co. reports 1931 net profit of \$10,353, against net loss of \$36,531 in 1930. Packard Motor Car Co. establishes sales record at New York automobile show with retail sales of 128 cars.
