FOOD PRICES NEAR PRE-WAR LEVEL, U. S. REPORT REVEALS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19. (AP)—The American housewife now can save, or spend for other things, 16 cents of every dollar formerly spent on food.

Figures made public today by the government bureau of labor statistics showed that food prices are nearing pre-war levels.

Reports from 51 American cities showed a decrease of nearly 17 per cent in food costs from Dec. 15, 1930 to Dec. 15, 1931, climaxed by a two per cent decrease from November to December, last year.

Dallas and Houston, Texas, were the only cities registering increased food costs in December, 1931.

Onions are almost a luxury compared with other food prices. They were one of six articles whose

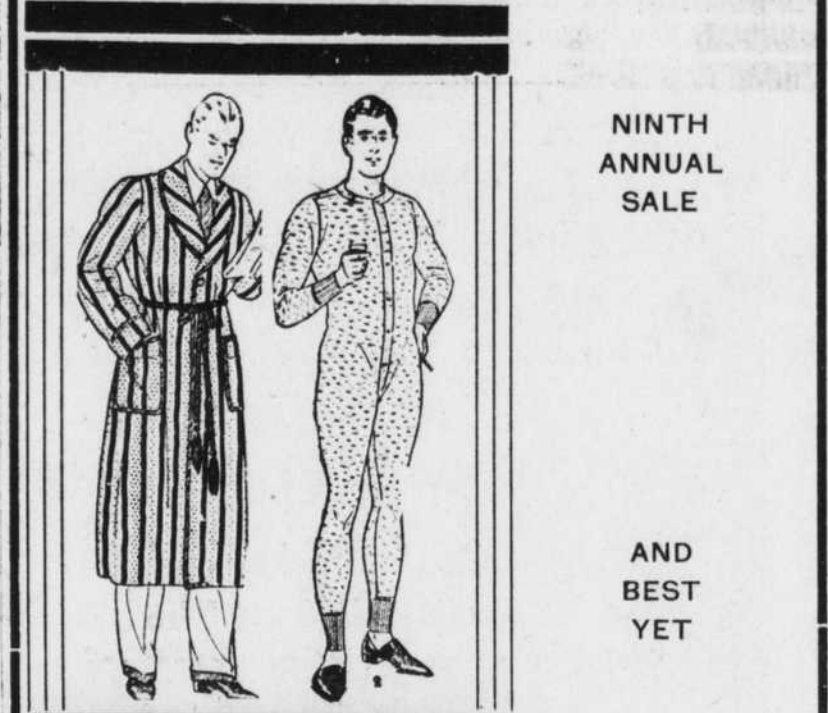
CULINARY 591 TO GIVE DANCE

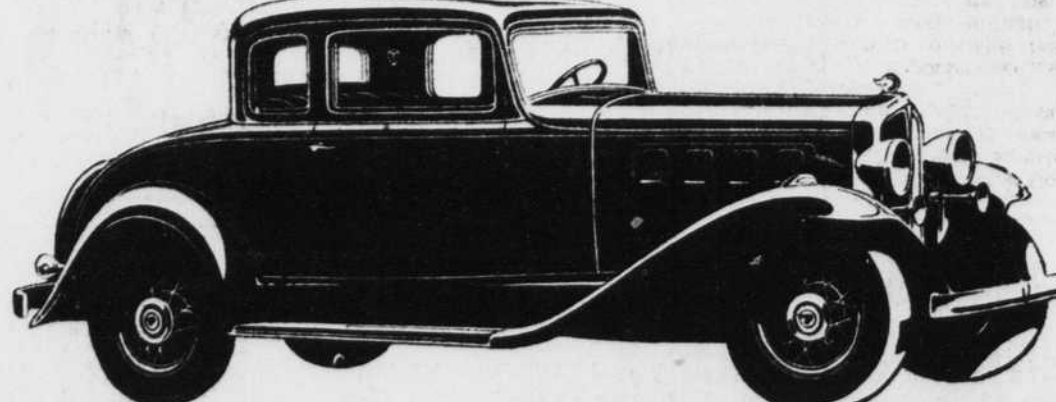
