THE ECONOMY WAVE

(Latest measures to cut governmental expenses as reported through the United Press)

NEW YORK, Jan. 20. (U.P.)—Seven hundred mechanics attached to the city sanitation department were put on a five-day week schedule, at a saving to the city of approximately \$5,000 a week.

HARRISBURG, Pa., Jan. 20. (U.P.)—Twelve state officials, including game protectors and veterinarians, were dropped from the payroll and replaced by seven men at a net saving of \$200 weekly.

TRENTON, N. J., Jan. 20. (U.P.)—Gov. A. Harry Moore, who recommended in his inaugural address on Tuesday that 35 state commissions be abolished in the interests of economy, began paring down all state budgets, declared New Jersey's budget for the fiscal year 1932-1933 will be balanced with the state's income.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Jan. 20. (U.P.)—So many economy bills came before the second special session of the Illinois legislature that the lawmakers were forced to appoint a committee to consider the best of them. The bills contemplated pay reductions of from 10 to 25 per cent for all elective and appointive officers. The committee is expected to work out a scheme which will follow Gov. Louis L. Emmerson's order to curb "the ever-increasing flow of government expenditures."

HAMMOND, Ind., Jan. 20. (U.P.)—The Hammond city council ordered a ten per cent reduction of wages today for 500 city employees, including police and firemen. The new pay scale will save \$124,000 a year.

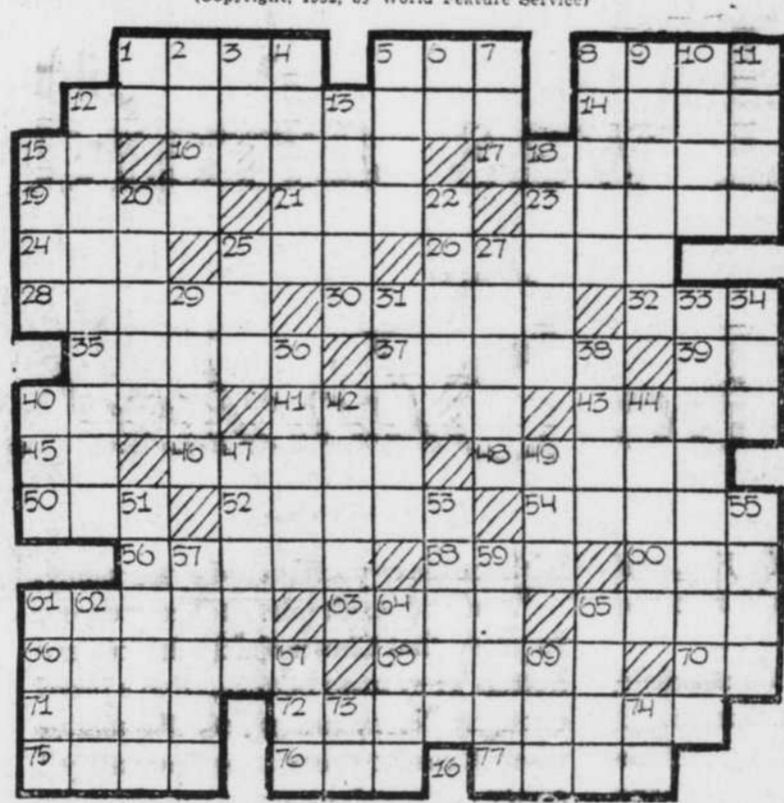

Affectionate Chimp Not Nuisance Southern California Official Says

HOLLYWOOD, Jan. 20. (U.P.)—A friendly chimpanzee should not be ruled a menace just because he bestowed a kiss upon a 12-year-old girl.

Such was the ruling of Harry Johnston, deputy city prosecutor, today after he had conducted a neighborhood hearing on the habits of Coy, Queenie and Yama, chimpanzees owned by Tony Gentry.

The chimpanzees, it was disclosed, sometimes slip out of their cages and roam about the neighborhood. A few residents declared it was nerve-racking to encounter the animals sitting on their doorsteps or strolling along the sidewalks. But most of the children of the section rallied to the support of Coy, Queenie and Yama, testifying that the beasts were excellent playmates and nursemaids, and were easily led back to their cages when they escaped.

George R. Worthington attempted to have the chimpanzees declared a nuisance after one of them had kissed his 12-year-old daughter. Gentry suggested that the animals probably developed loving habits while acting in motion pictures. He offered considerable testimony to prove that chimpanzees generally are mild-mannered, friendly and harmless.

The only chimpanzee that ever ran amuck in Hollywood was the famous Joe Martin, film star. Joe got indignant because, during the filming of a picture, he was kicked in the face eight times. He looked astonished seven times, but the eighth was too much. He went berserk and was sentenced to die.

A'S OUTFIELDER HAS NO WORRIES

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Jan. 20. (U.P.)—Al Simmons, Philadelphia Athletics' outfielder and American league batting champion, said today the three-year contract he signed last year had two more years to run and that he had no salary worries. The three-year contract is believed to call for a total of \$100,000.

MARKETS AT A GLANCE

NEW YORK, Jan. 20. (U.P.)—After a good deal of indecision in the early trading, the stock market engaged in a spirited rally near the close today.

The late rally, led by a sudden advance in grains, lifted prices on an average of several points and carried the market in general to within striking distance of the highs attained last week. Trading volume increased toward the close but total transactions amounted to only 1,200,000 shares, against 1,000,000 shares yesterday.

There was little to account for the rise except the betterment of the technical position of the market resulting from the recent selling operations. Traders were not willing to press sales in view of the ability of the market to hold within a narrow range, while some bulls were disposed to gamble on the outcome of prospective developments overhauling the list.

These included the railroad wage conference at Chicago, which showed no further progress today; the extent of the gold movement abroad and the current difficulties in municipal finances. Another prospect making for lessened speculative activity is the meeting next Tuesday of the United States Steel Corp. directors of which will vote on the first quarter dividend and make public earnings results for last year.

Because of the position of the Steel Corp. as a pace-setter for American industry, its dividend policy will be watched closely by business men. Elimination of the current \$4 common dividend has been expected but if the directors declare a payment or merely postpone action, it would be considered constructive.

Fears concerning the safety of General Electric's present \$1.60 annual dividend rate increased today and resulted in another spill in the stock that carried it to the lowest levels ever reached for the present capitalization. General Electric's sales in the last quarter of 1931 were 36 per cent under the corresponding period of last year and many traders think that the current movement toward municipal economy will cause continued shrinkage this year. A large part of the company's business is for street lighting, power houses and the like.

The main body of stocks was little affected by the persistent weakness in this leader, however, prices readily responding to the late buying power. Steel common, in the face of dividend fears, added nearly two points, while Auburn Auto came through with a characteristic 6 1/2 point climb. Corresponding improvement was marked up in other sections, no special group being singled out for buying. Buying of a pool character was noted in Kreuger and Toll.

Railroad stocks, leaders of the recent advance, paid little attention to the continued delay on the wage negotiations and moved up with the remainder of the market. Railroad bonds, however, made spirited advances and managed to pull the entire bond market higher after sluggish movement in the early trading.
