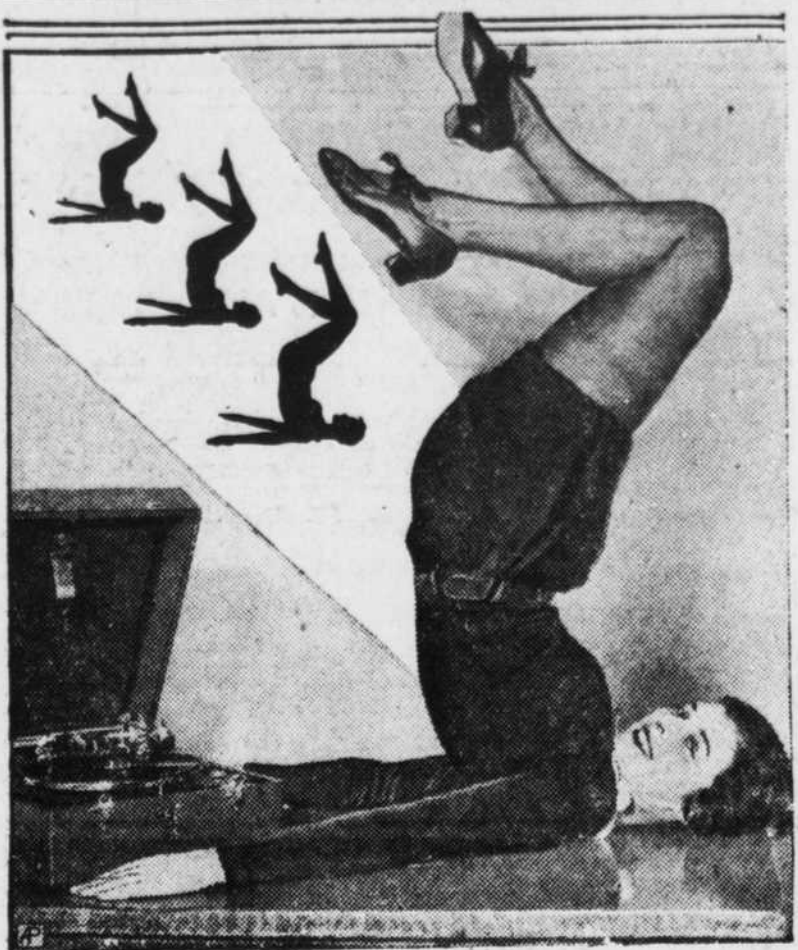


### WAISTLINE LEARNS ITS A-B-C

For the good old "wood-chopping" stunt—remember that one, where you stand with your feet apart and bring your clasped hands down between your knees and then up over your head?—the phonograph plays "Ach, Du Lieber Augustine." Ach, indeed!

There are three records, labelled "A," "B" and "C." Each takes five minutes, each has grooves that give you time out for rest, and on each the encouraging voice of Fraulein Mezey tells you what to do and says soothingly, "There, just a little more now, 'Don't wobble.' 'Keep your back stiff,' and so on."

### CONGRESS TO PUSH RELIEF

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21. (AP)—Congress threw its pressure behind economic relief legislation today. It took final action on the \$125,000,000 farm relief bill and cleared the way for fast action tomorrow on the \$2,000,000,000 reconstruction finance corporation bill, keystone of the administration emergency program.

President Hoover in a special message asked the house appropriations committee to appropriate \$500,000,000 for the full authorized capital of the reconstruction corporation. Members of the committee said the measure would be drafted and expedited through both houses immediately after final enactment of the reconstruction bill.

The farm loan bank bill was sent to the White House for the President's signature. Under the measure the government will advance \$125,000,000 to the federal land bank system. Of this amount \$25,000,000 will be used to postpone payment of interest on farm mortgages against near bankrupt farmers.

### UTAHAN KILLED IN ODD MISHAP

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 21. (AP)—While attempting to crank the propeller of plane, James Swyer, 48, prominent Salt Lake business man, was instantly killed here today. The plane was owned by an aviation service, owned by Swyer bearing his name.

The accident occurred late today at the local airport. Swyer and his mechanics had just completed overhauling the motor of the plane when he attempted to start the propeller whirling. It whipped in the opposite direction, crushing the man's skull badly.

### MISSISSIPPI WATER RISES

JACKSON, Miss., Jan. 21. (AP)—The Mississippi river tonight felt the heaviest flood waters that have ravaged north Mississippi for the past month.

The resultant rise on the Mississippi has caused increasing alarm. At Vicksburg, the river's stage was 41.3 feet. If the Mississippi rises another 1.7 feet the Yazoo river will not be able to drain the flooded section of the state with the great river forcing its way back into its lower reaches, and with flood waters from the Tallahatchie and Yalobusha swelling its upper reaches, additional tremendous strain will be thrown at the levees.

The rise in the Mississippi tonight made it apparent that flood waters would not be drained from north Mississippi for weeks.
