PERKINS VERSE ON LOST CITY

The following original poem written by George E. Perkins, is first presented to the reading public through the columns of The Age. The author, and his two brothers, John and Fay Perkins, have been closely identified with Dr. M. R. Harrington in the work of excavating the ruins of the prehistoric "Buried City," located near St. Thomas.

THE PEOPLE OF YESTERDAY By George E. Perkins I stood on a wind-swept mesa O'er-looking the bare desert floor. And I thought of the untold ages And the Ancients who lived long before. I saw the old ruins and dwellings, Long since tumbled down and decayed. And I drew in my mind's eye a picture Of those "People of Yesterday." And I dug in those ancient ruins Far down to the packed 'dobe floor. And I delved 'neath the walls and the hearthstones In the homes of the people of yore. When lo! In a vault in one corner All made with adobe and stone, I found what was left of the builder— All gone back to earth but his bones. Grouped 'round him his earthly possessions, Buried there through the ages untold; Rare vases, stone axes and spear points Worth far more than silver and gold. Crude beads, made from shells and from turquoise, Locked away from the world for safe-keep; Each separate piece holds a story Of a race in its last long sleep. I strolled through those ruins and wondered Just what was this date long ago When this people of "Sunny Nevada" Trod these mountains and vales, to and fro. Perhaps in the distant dark ages, In the dim, by-gone past which has fled— They lived, loved and wooed, and were happy; These folks who have long since been dead.
