

MARKETS AT A GLANCE

By RICHARD L GRIDLEY United Press Financial Writer NEW YORK, Jan. 22. (U.P.)-The

1932 stock market suffered its first relapse today. The break came little warning around the start of the last hour of trading and carried the price level to a point where above half the gains registered since the start of the year were erased.

Nothing in the news accounted for the sudden seil-off, but many of the larger traders have been out the market for a week and it tcok relatively little selling pressure to force substantial reactions in various speculative leaders. Dealings during the early part of the session showed the

meaningless price movements that have characterized trading ever since the peak of the new year rally was reached a week ago. Even on the late decline, activity was not lacking, indicating that the market still was in the hands of a group of professional traders.

Public buying has been restricted because of the desire of investors to await a test of the market's position. That began today and the movements over the next few sessions will be scanned closely for signs of whether the current reaction was merely a correction of the market's position or a resumption of the major decline. This apathy was apparent to-

day. Several early attempts to ata following on the upside failed just like they did in the previous session and this reluctance of the market to resume its rise created considerable pessimism and led to considerable speculative selling in the closing dealings.

Losses at the close ranged from one to a half-dozen points in the speculative leaders, most of them finishing around their worst levels Even the rails, which formed the bulwark for the morning firmness, sold off with other sections of the

L-sues with a large speculative following like United States Steel, General Electric, General Motors and Auburn Auto were principal losers, General Electric selling at a further new low for the present shares and Auburn skidding more than 5 points. Steel common lost more than 3 points as the time drew near for directors to act upon the common dividend for the first




