\$8,000 Y. M. C. A. FOR BOULDER CITY TO BE STARTED SOON

Announcement was made yesterday of the new \$8,000 Y. M. C. A. building to be soon erected in Boulder City on Wyoming at Avenue B. by H. L. Sweet.

The attractive building is designed by L. Henry Smith, local architect, of concrete blocks, finished with stucco exterior and tile roof, in a modified Spanish style.

Featured is a long arcade over the sidewalk in front, spacious store windows, and an air conditioning plant. In addition to club rooms and lunch counter, the establishment will have space for a drug store and a small shop.

The building, 30 by 113 feet in size, is one story high. Construction is expected to start within ten days and to be finished with the place ready for occupancy by April 1.
