THE ECONOMY WAVE

(Latest measures to cut government expenses as reported through The United Press)

BRIDGEPORT, Conn. (U.P.)—National state and municipal governments should employ economists, not politicians, to handle finances “if we are to call a halt to the reckless spending splurge,” Gov. Wilbur L. Cross declared. “People will not stand for further expenses in government, but relief will never come if the work is done by mere politicians.”

JERSEY CITY, N. J. (U.P.)—The Hudson county boulevard commission abolished the position of captain of the boulevard police, dropping Thomas J. Hanly from the payroll at a saving of \$4,000 a year. The powers and duties of the captain constitute duplication, since the chief performs the same duties,” the commissioners said.

BOSTON, (U.P.)—Governor Joseph B. Ely submitted his 1932 state budget to the legislature today and it allowed for a 10 per cent salary cut for all state employees receiving \$2,000 or more annually. He estimated a saving of \$570,000 would result. The budget was for \$69,533,698.65, \$3,000,000 less than the 1931 figure. If accepted, the governor said, it would result in savings of nearly \$4,500,000 from the actual appropriation from current revenue made in 1931.

WASHINGTON, (U.P.)—A bill was introduced in the house today by Chairman Cochran of the house expenditures committee calling for abolition of the government's efficiency bureau which he described “as the most useless of all bureaus.” He introduced another bill to consolidate all personnel activities of the government under one head.

WASHINGTON, (U.P.)—Sixty thousand dollars was lopped off the appropriation for the American delegation to the Geneva disarmament conference by the house appropriations committee today. Secretary of State Stimson asked for \$450,000 and the committee approved \$390,000.

IN BUSINESS PROBE STARTS BRIGHT SPOTS INTO MISHAP

Rodman Manufacturing Co. recalls 200 employees as Rhode Island mills reopen to fill new orders. Crosley Radio Corp. reports net profit for nine months ended December 31, 1931, of \$21,466, against net loss of \$445,958 in like 1930 period. Centralia shirt factory reopens after three-year shutdown; 100 workers recalled. New England Public Service Co. reports increase of 19.89 per cent in 1931 electric output. National Fertilizer association wholesale price index rises to 64 on first gain in many weeks. Kansas City Power & Light Co. reports 1931 net income of \$4,516,972, against \$4,030,295 in 1930. Endicott-Johnson Corp. reports 1932 orders “much ahead of expectations.” Gov. James Rolph, Jr., of California has announced he will visit and place a wreath on the graves of the state's 29 former governors.

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK. KANSAS CITY, Jan. 25. (U.P.)—Sheep alone were able to surmount the obstacle of dull trading today on the Kansas City livestock market and sold from 10 to 75 cents higher. Cattle showed weakness and hogs were 10 cents lower. Hog receipts were excessive. Sheep and cattle supplies were light. Steers and yearlings sold from \$4.50 to \$7.50. Top fat hogs were down to \$3.80, and the bulk of sales ranged from \$3.00 to \$3.80. Lambs sold from \$5 to \$6.25. Gamalization of the Ohio river was urged as early as 1783.

MARKETS AT A GLANCE

NEW YORK, Jan. 25. (U.P.)—The apathy in the stock market became pronounced today as traders continued to await the outcome of the railroad wage meeting and the first quarter dividend meeting of the United States Steel Corp. scheduled for tomorrow.

Activity fell off to approximately 800,000 shares, the dullist trading since early September.

Tickers barely moved and price movements were so narrow as to discourage even the most agile traders from attempting to catch the hour-to-hour swings. Prices, however, closed firm, although not far from their previous closing levels, indicating the street was still confident of better times.

On few occasions has an impending meeting of the United States Steel corporation caused such a restriction of trading on the stock exchange. Whether Steel directors will order the regular quarterly payment of \$1 on the common stock at their meeting after the close tomorrow as a gesture of confidence or choose to eliminate the payment was an event that few traders ventured to predict.

The prolongation of the railway labor conference at Chicago where railroads are negotiating for a ten per cent wage reduction was wearing on traders' nerves and served to augment the Steel dividend uncertainty as a factor in the lethargic action of the market.

Little attention was paid to such constructive developments as the continued progress of the \$2,000,000,000 reconstruction finance corp. business aid organization sponsored by the administration, and the agreement of foreign creditors of German banks to extend the current credits frozen under the standstill agreement for a period of one year.

Business news affecting stock prices was not important, although the magazine Steel, noted further slight improvement in that business. Sentiment abroad showed further improvement as Europeans took a more sane attitude on the present economic aid plans in this country which at first they supposed involved heavy inflation.

This improvement was indicated by a sharp drop in the price of the French franc, which fell below the gold point as foreigners sold francs to buy dollars. Help to sentiment also was given by the decision of the Bank of England to repay by February 1 the balance of 15,000,000 pounds sterling borrowed last summer from the federal reserve in its unsuccessful attempt to prevent Great Britain from going off the gold standard.

Because of tomorrow's Steel meeting and the uncertainty over the railway wage conference stocks were unable to take advantage of these favorable developments. Fractional changes were the rule with the entire list closely following the erratic fluctuations of United States Steel.

The painting is that of Henry Wood, former county clerk of Lyon county, who, when he died in 1925, left his entire estate of \$29,000 to the orphan's home that “pleasing and useful gifts might be purchased for the children at Christmas time.” It was prepared from an old photograph of Mr. Wood at the order of the home's board of directors.
