

FAVOR SCHAAF IN BOXING TRIAL AT N. Y.

Baer, Paulino, King Levinsky Are All In Eliminations

NEW YORK, Jan. 25. (U.P.)—Ernie Schaaf of Boston is the favorite to pound his way through a series of heavyweight elimination bouts at Madison Square Garden during the next six weeks, and thus to become alternate for Jack Sharkey in the Max Schmeling title bout here in June.

James J. Johnston, manager of boxing at the Garden, announced tonight that the winner of the bouts would replace Sharkey against Schmeling in case anything happened to Sharkey at the last minute.

The three elimination bouts are scheduled as follows:

January 29—King Levinsky of Chicago vs. Max Baer of San Francisco, ten rounds.

February 5—Ernie Schaaf of Boston vs. Paulino Uzcudun of Spain, ten rounds.

February 26 or March 4—Winners of first two bouts meet in 15-rounder.

Levinsky is a 6 to 5 favorite to defeat Baer, and Schaaf is an 8 to 5 favorite to win over Uzcudun. If Levinsky and Schaaf meet in the 15-round final, Schaaf probably will be installed as a 7 to 5 favorite over the Chicago fish merchant.

Both Baer and Levinsky are harder hitters than Schaaf, and the veteran Paulino is the most rugged of the four. But Schaaf is the better boxer, having assimilated most of the tricks of the trade from his stable-mate, Jack Sharkey. Schaaf is rated as the most promising of all the younger heavyweights.

Baer, the 25-year-old Californian with the man-killing punch, may defeat Levinsky if he connects squarely with the button; but this will be a new experience for Levinsky. Boxing experts believe Levinsky's wild, continuous attack will wear the Californian down. Baer is a stand-up fighter something like Tommy Loughran. Levinsky likes this sort of fighter because they offer more openings for his vicious swings. Baer lost to Paulino in a 20-round bout at Reno, July 4, but he has improved much since then.

Although Paulino, 33-year-old iron man of the ring, is rugged and a hard man to hit squarely because of his "shell type" of defense, the experts believe the clever Schaaf will have little difficulty in winning a decision over him. However, there is slight chance of the wood cutter's being knocked out.

Baer, whose right cross to the jaw killed Frankie Campbell in San Francisco about two years ago, is training hard for his affair with Levinsky, and many of his supporters believe he will prove an upset in the eliminations. He is recognized as one of the hardest hitters among the present heavyweights. The odds

JACK KEARNS TURNED DOWN

CHICAGO, Jan. 25. (U.P.)—Jack Kearns appeared before the National Boxing association today to claim the heavyweight title for Mickey Walker. He was informed by Gen. John V. Clinkin that Walker would have to fight for the title.

"Walker is a leading contender but we can't give the title to him or anyone else," said Gen. Clinkin. "Schmeling refused to fight Walker," said Kearns. "Walker will fight anyone, Schmeling, Dempsey or Sharkey. They are afraid of him."

GAR WOOD'S TRY FOR MARK BALKED

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Jan. 25. (U.P.)—Gar Wood clocked a nautical mile in 37.39 seconds or 111.14 statute miles per hour in an attempt to better the world speedboat mark of 110.223 m.p.h. here today but another craft loomed in his path and prevented an official record.

Wood announced he would resume the trials over the Indian creek course behind his winter residence here tomorrow. His Miss America IX, which is threatened with destruction if it fails to establish a new world mark, seemed to reach the highest speed in its career for that short distance today.

"I will make more speed tomorrow," Wood declared. "My motors were cold and haven't been run in weeks. They are cleared out now and I should have a couple of miles to spare tomorrow."

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WILL HOLD RING TRIALS MARCH 3

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 25. (U.P.)—Arrangements have been completed to hold the Pacific coast intercollegiate boxing tryouts for the Olympic games in Sacramento March 3 and 4, in conjunction with the coast college championships.

A college boxing team to represent the coast at the national collegiate tryouts at Penn State April 1 and 2 will be selected from those competing here. The tournament is sanctioned by the Olympic games selection committee.

All members of the Pacific Coast conference, the Northwest conference, the Far Western conference and Southern conference will be invited to send boxers to the tournament here.

VOTES ON MAX SHOW DEFEAT

CHICAGO, Jan. 25. (U.P.)—Early voting in the National Boxing association's poll of its membership on the question of vacating Max Schmeling's heavyweight title indicated today that the German would be deprived of his laurels. Five votes have been received and two other states have communicated by telephone. The vote now stands: To vacate the title, 4; to extend the time limit, 3. Arkansas, Illinois, Wisconsin and Michigan voted to vacate, while Missouri, Michigan and Minnesota voted to extend the time limit. Missouri and Minnesota stipulated, however, that Schmeling must post a suitable forfeit and sign a binding contract to meet a worthy opponent.

CARNERA KO'S ITALIAN PUG

PARIS, Jan. 25. (U.P.)—Primo Carnera, Italian heavyweight, scored a technical knockout over Moise Bouquillon, French giant, in the second round of their scheduled ten-round bout at the new Sports Palace here tonight. BRAVES GALES TO VISIT LONE ISLES

UNALASKA, Alaska, Jan. 25. (U.P.)—In olden times, in other lands, Capt. Andrew Nelson might have been the hero of the Norse saga. In the ocean lanes where the big ships ply the rugged, bearded captain of the little 60-footer Eunice may be unknown, but he's a hero to the folks on the lonely Aleutian islands. For Capt. Nelson, last year and this, dared what no ship master ever tried before. He has been making regular winter trips through the treacherous seas that extend 800 miles to the west of Unalaska from the tumbling Bering sea to the stormy North Pacific on the south. No one but Capt. Nelson has ever attempted to navigate the treacherous piece of water in winter. Terrific gales, combined with strong and furious tides, have made the run a graveyard of venturesome ships. The Aleutians have abundant resources. But until Capt. Nelson made the venture, no master had dared risk his vessel against the rich prize of cross, red and blue foxes. The Eunice makes her calls, fair weather or foul, through hurricanes and blizzards, in seas that wash her decks completely over. At the wheel, Capt. Nelson avoids the hidden reefs, fights the running tides. During 1931 Capt. Nelson took the Eunice for trips totaling a mileage of 20,500 miles. For Christmas last year Capt. Nelson took a Yule tree to Atka. It was the first ever seen on that island, barren of all trees and shrubbery. Not only a trader and sailor is Capt. Nelson. He's the patron of the isolated communities he visits. He hauls freight ashore; he visits homes. He brings special letters, delivers oral messages. He remembers

LAKE PLACID, Jan. 25. (U.P.)—Stamp collectors from all sections of the United States attended today's opening sale of the special commemorative stamp in honor of the Third Olympic Winter Games.

State troopers were on duty at the post office at 5 a. m., when crowds began to collect. More than 400 persons were standing in line when the office opened at 7 a. m. The stamps, of which 25,000,000 have been issued, are of two-cent denomination. Four hundred thousand were sent to Lake Placid for the opening day's sale. They were sold out before the day ended.
