And News of The Hoover Dam Project

Week Unusually Active At Boulder As Work At River and City Reaches High Speed; Records Are Smashed

Activity On Project Reported By U. S. Bureau

Indicating some of the most rapid progress yet made in a single week on the Hoover dam project, the weekly progress report sheet was placed on file in the reclamation bureau office Monday night.

During the past week work at the dam site included the starting of the driving of the seven by ten foot "tephole" in the inclined spillway tunnel on the Arizona side.

Work on the spillway cut on the Nevada side was shut, the rock and earth loosened with blasting preparatory to cutting spillway room around the top of the actual dam.

A new record was made last Wednesday when 256 linear feet of the big 41 by 56 foot tunnels were excavated in a single 24-hour shift.

CIVIC MINDED

BETTER DISTRIBUTION

DEATH OF A woman physician yesterday, coupled with the mad air dash from New York through hail and winds to take an "automatic lung" to a dying girl in Arizona, brings forcibly to mind that medical science in all its wisdom and with all its skill and resourcefulness has failed to properly distribute aid through these United States of ours. The physician who had spent her life ministering to poverty stricken mountaineers, died before serum could be obtained. The serum is produced at only two laboratories in the United States, both in the east. Luckily, the Arizona girl recovered without benefit of the heavy apparatus, but for a small boy, in the same hospital, the big tank arrived too late. It would seem that those who endow laboratories and back research work would be doing a double service if these scientific aids to the afflicted were distributed more widely.

UGLY PICTURE

GUARDS WERE added to the garrison in the international settlement in Shanghai yesterday. Japan, warlike, was landing more warships into the Chinese harbor. Japan threatened to take "direct action" to break the Chinese boycott of Nipponese goods. It is problematical what will happen if the Japanese marines invade the settlement, for the settlement is not Chinese—it's virtually international, as the name implies. Japan will then be stepping on the toes of the United States, England, France, Italy and others. The picture is not a pretty one.

WHO'S AFRAID

MARY Roberts Rinehart says the depression is due to fear and that if the women who do more than fifty per cent of the spending would just get normal and quit being afraid everything would be all right. Mary evidently thinks women should spend it all. Her estimate of fifty per cent as the present spending ability of the women is, we fear, greatly under-estimated.
