MARKETS AT A GLANCE

NEW YORK, Jan. 26. (U.P.)—Stock market dealings came to a standstill today as traders awaited the United States Steel corporation's 1931 earnings report and first quarter dividend action make public after the close of the market.

The Steel news was somewhat worse than expected but came too late to have an influence on price movements. Directors of the company declared a dividend of 50 cents a share for the first quarter, against the previous quarterly payment of \$1 a share, or about in line with expectations. The earnings report for 1931, showing only \$3.68 a share earned on the preferred stock, however, compared with predictions of \$5.50 or \$6 a share.

Los Angeles and San Francisco stock markets, which are open later than the New York market, reflected the disappointment over the news. Steel selling at 40 on the Los Angeles curb and at 27 1/2 on the San Francisco curb market, compared with the New York closing of 41 1/2.

Trading in stocks here clearly reflected the reluctance of traders to place commitments on either side of the market with the Steel news overhanging the financial community. Prices, in general, however, displayed a fairly firm tone throughout on a turnover of approximately 800,000 shares.

An additional restraint to speculative activity was furnished by the continued deadlock in the railroad labor war negotiations at Chicago. Dispatches from the mid-west have repeatedly stated that an agreement was imminent but constant repetition of the report has served to make many traders cautious. When the meeting finally is disbanded, the stock market will better reflect actual developments.

About the only break in the monotony of the steady stream of almost unchanged prices was a sudden spurt in the St. Louis southwestern issues, which rose rapidly on conditional approval of the Interstate Commerce commission of the acquisition of the road by the Southern Pacific. Present plans call for the exchange of three shares of Southwest for one share of Southern Pacific and five shares of Southwest preferred for three shares of Southern Pacific. The stocks moved up to these ratios. Southwest common rising nearly 2 points to 10 1/2 and the preferred 13 points to 21 1/2.

U. S. STEEL SHARES BREAK SHARPLY

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 26. (U.P.)—United States Steel common broke sharply on the curb exchange here today following announcement of the directors that the regular quarterly dividend had been cut from one dollar to fifty cents.

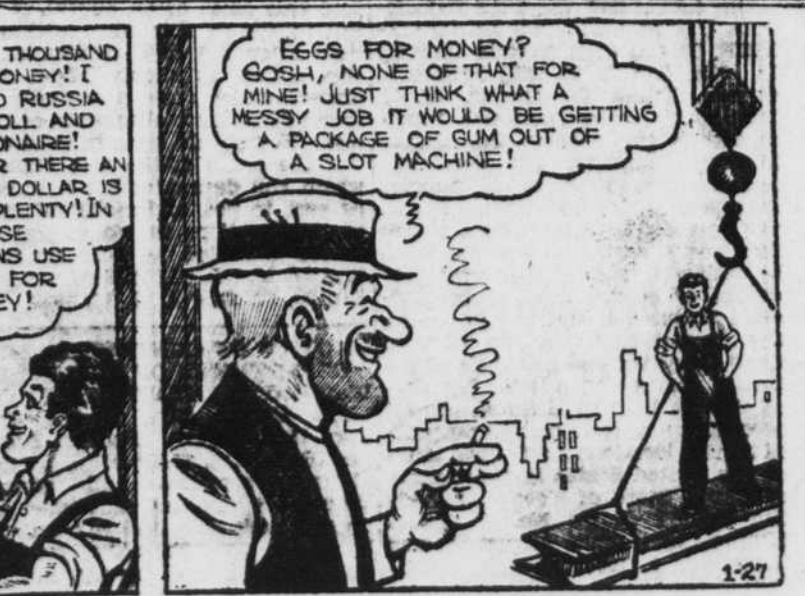
