WEDNESDAY IN CONGRESS

SENATE
Judiciary committee voted to report favorably a bill drastically limiting the powers of federal judges in the use of injunctions against labor and in contempt of court actions, many of which affect newspapers.

Vice President Curtis signed \$500,000,000 reconstruction finance corporation appropriation bill. R. C. Stephenson, former president of the American Bankers' association told a senate subcommittee that Hoover's proposed loan bank system to expedite building and relieve unemployment was undesirable.

Banking and currency committee voted favorable report on the names of Charles G. Dawes, Jesse H. Jones and Harvey C. Couch to be directors of the reconstruction finance corporation. Leaders attempted to shelve Glass banking bill to concentrate upon efforts to obtain speedy action on the Thomas bill for relief of depositors of closed banks.

President Hoover submitted diplomatic correspondence to senate showing this government for months had expressed concern over Manchurian situation.

Further evidence of grocers and druggists in favor of the "fair trade" bill to prevent cut-rate business methods was advanced to the interstate commerce committee.

HOUSE
Major General Lytle Brown, chief of army engineers, informed flood control committee he would not endorse the proposed straightening of the Mississippi river without formal engineering studies. Speaker John Garner signed the \$300,000,000 reconstruction finance corporation appropriation bill. Passed resolution directing interstate commerce commission investigate possibility of a six hour day for rail employees.

Patriotic societies opposed admission of conscientious objectors to citizenship in hearings before immigration committee.

Military affairs committee began conference preparatory to drafting Neale Shivers bill.

Rapid agriculture department annual supply bill, carrying appropriations of \$175,443,814.

MARKETS AT A GLANCE

NEW YORK, Jan. 27. (UP)—The stock market steadied today after breaking sharply in the early trading on a wave of disappointed selling touched off by the overnight halving of the Steel Corporation common dividend and publication of its unfavorable 1931 earnings statement.

Railroad stocks were buoyed by Chicago advices that three-quarters of the railroad unions had agreed upon a wage proposal and this news was quickly interpreted as indicating the terms would be favorable to the railroads. Sentiment in the rails also was bolstered by the declaration of the regular quarterly dividend of 50 cents a share by Pennsylvania railroad directors, a payment that had been considered in doubt by many quarters.

The Pennsylvania dividend action, however, was accompanied by a statement similar to that issued with the Steel Corporation dividend action last night. It predicted a continuation of dividends on an improvement in business conditions. Tomorrow afternoon, Bethlehem Steel directors meet for dividend action and omission of the \$2 annual rate is expected.

Many observers were inclined to believe that the action of the market was favorable in the face of the Steels news and this feeling was largely responsible for the relatively steady tone displayed by the market in the late trading. Some increase in the short interest was noted judging from the demand for stocks in the loan crowd after the close of the market. This strengthened the position of the market.

Bulls were not disposed to push operations, however, in view of the continued uncertainty in the railroad wage situation. This made for rather listless trading late in the day and activity for the entire session approximated only 1,200,000 shares despite a heavy first hour. In addition to the Steel Corporation 1931 earnings statement, two other important ones made their appearance and were of a more favorable nature from the viewpoint of the stockholders. General Motors earned \$2.01 a common share in 1931, while Woolworth, after inclusion of some special income, earned \$4.24 a share. Rather heavy profit-taking was attracted by the "good news" of the latter announcement.

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK
KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 27. (UP)—Light supplies brought a five-cent advance to hogs today on the Kansas City livestock market. Cattle and sheep, with receipts moderate, sold steady. Steers and yearlings ranged from \$5 to \$8.50. Top fat hogs were \$3.85 and the bulk of sales ranged from \$3.65 to \$3.85. Lambs sold from \$5 to \$6.15.
