

Secret Key To Spanish Bandits' Treasure Cache Held by Vegas Man

(Continued from Page One) wishing to make further atonement for my many sins of the past, for which I pray to the Blessed Virgin Marie to forgive me, make the following statement in hope that the information will be used to help many families.

"I was formerly a chief of a band of bandits, and for many years terrorized the country north of El Paso del Norte and north of the Rio Bravo del Norte for many miles. I robbed (packed) trains coming from Socorro, New Mexico to Mexico City, and those returning from there.

"Those from the north often contained silver bars, and those going north contained provisions and money for the payment of the soldiers stationed in New Mexico.

"I killed many people and my sins hang heavy upon my mind. I implore Jesus Christ to forgive me, to intercede for me, that I may not be consigned to the everlasting fires of Hell. I have money and other valuable things hidden, and now about to die, I ask you to seek for these things, and use them for the benefit of the poor.

"Having thus satisfied yourself that you are in the right place, go to the north side of the entrance and look for a pile of rock directly across from the houses—there is enough for a dig and you will come to a juniper log. KING REFUSES CYR'S DEMAND

BATON ROUGE, La., Jan. 27. (U.P.)—The final ultimatum in Louisiana's battle of the governor was delivered today and duly scorned. The situation remained unchanged, with two active "sovereigns" in the field, one "in" and defending state offices with arms, and the other "out" and clamoring for justice.

Alvin O. King, who is "in," received, by registered mail, a formal demand from Dr. Paul N. Cyr, who is "out," that he surrender the governor's mansion. King read the letter, called a secretary and promptly dictated a refusal.

King has the backing of practically all administration officials. Cyr is supported by an anti-administration group of politicians.

KINGMAN MAN IS MURDERED

KINGMAN, Ariz., Jan. 27. (U.P.)—James Burke, watchman at the famous Katherine gold mine 49 miles west of here, was dead tonight, and his former partner, Frank Pinkerton, prospector, was held incommunicado in the Mohave county jail.

Pinkerton telephoned authorities late this afternoon and said: "I have just shot a man; I want to surrender." Sheriff's deputies drove to a doctor to the mine, where they found Burke, shot through the head and breast.

The men, once partners, were said to have quarreled over some unknown matter, and agreed to shoot it out.

COP-KILLERS' BROTHER HELD

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., Jan. 27. (U.P.)—Oscar Young, who admitted he supplied his brothers, Harry and Jennings, with the guns they used to murder six peace officers here, today was held for trial as an accessory before the fact.

Young's bond was set at \$10,000 following his preliminary hearing. His wife, charged with him, was released.

Young told officers Harry and Jennings borrowed a shotgun and rifle from him to go hunting an hour before they murdered Sheriff Marcell Hendrix of Greene county, a deputy and four Springfield officers.

"GOVERNORS' BATTLE NEAR

BATON ROUGE, La., Jan. 27. (U.P.)—The second "Battle of the Governors" broke out in full fury tonight when Dr. Paul N. Cyr, backed by a strong force of politicians, invaded the capital, set up Headquarters and took the formal oath as governor in a test of strength with the ruling executive, Alvin O. King.

Cyr, who claims he is the legal governor and that King is an "usurper," went to district court and demanded that he be administered the governor's oath. A deputy clerk complied.

JAP WARSHIPS THREATEN CHINA

lieved to have strengthened the Japanese determination to act.

The precautions taken by foreign military officials in the international settlement and the nervousness of Chinese sections of the city left Shanghai prepared for any eventuality, but generally convinced that the Japanese imperial navy will take control in the Yangtze valley. Three cruisers already have been sent up the river to Nanking, the capital.

JAP ADMIRAL GRIM

Admiral Shiosawa, commanding the Japanese fleet, has been polite but grim in his conferences with officials seeking a settlement of the conflict, but he is expected to indicate within the next 18 hours whether the navy will follow the lead of the Japanese army in Manchuria in its aggressive policy against the Chinese.

It was understood that Consul General Murai was prepared to reject any reply which the Chinese make to the ultimatum because he has insisted on dissolution of all forms of Chinese opposition to Japan, which Chinese officials say would mean suppression of the press, freedom of speech and constitutional rights.

The Japanese flagship Ataka, with Admiral Shiosawa on the bridge, moved up the river and anchored directly opposite the Japanese Consulate General.

Japanese charged that a Chinese member of the "dare to die" corps threw the bomb, but no arrests were made. The bomb shattered a window and caused panic among the prisoners at the consulate, who are awaiting deportation to Nagasaki to be tried on charges of slaying a settlement constable a week ago.

MARTIAL LAW

The municipal council met at 11 a. m. It was expected it would approve a proposal by Secretary-General Stirling Fessenden, an American, that a state of emergency be proclaimed at 4 p. m.

Thereafter martial law will be in force in the international settlement.

NANKING, Thursday, Jan. 28. (U.P.)—General Tsai Ting-Kai, commanding Chinese forces at Shanghai, telegraphed the government tonight that "My army is prepared to shed all its blood in the Whang-poo river to resist Japanese aggression."

Chinese newspapers here unannouncedly advocated armed resistance at Shanghai.

MEDALS GIVEN LIFE-SAVERS

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Jan. 27. (U.P.)—A truck driver and a 15-year-old schoolboy were awarded silver medals by the Carnegie hero fund commission today for heroism in saving or attempting to save a life. The commission also awarded 21 bronze medals.

Those receiving the silver medals are Homer J. Powers, 41, Charlotte, Mich., and Ashton H. Baker, 15, Greenwich, Conn.
