## NEW BUILDING NEARLY DONE

The new Fairbanks building situated on B. Avenue, now under construction by F. C. Snell, contractor, will be ready for occupancy within the next thirty days, according to W. J. Locker, general foreman.

The new structure is practically two buildings in one, of which one section is 50 by 70 feet and the other 40 by 85 feet. The 50 by 70 section will be a store for men's furnishings, operated by Roy Fairbanks.

The other section will be operated by Laubach as a recreation room and pool hall. It will contain a lunch counter, tobacco and soft drink stand.

These buildings are constructed of cement blocks, similar to the other independent business structures in the vicinity.

The F. C. Snell company is building a 16 by 32 foot building located on Nevada boulevard, which will be operated as a shoe shop by Mrs. Thompson. Just recently this contractor completed a six room brick dwelling on Utah street for the California and Nevada power company.

## VEGAS VERDE FORM OWN GROUP

Repudiating the action of the group responsible for the announcement of the change of the name "Vegas Verde" to "North Las Vegas" for the rapidly growing community north of this city on the Salt Lake highway, members of the original organizers of the Vegas Verde group yesterday went on record as being opposed to the change of name and the changing of the original site for the school house projected for that community.

A special committee, composed of members of the original association, Mrs. C. C. Bray, chairman; I. A. Stevens, and Robert Nanney, are reported to have received assurance from a member of the school board that the site originally proposed for the school house had been approved and was on file at Carson City, and that a change at this date would be difficult to accomplish.

The committee is also reported to have received word that the community, due to the early organization of the original Vegas Verde group, would be known by that name in the event of locating a postoffice there, unless the post-office department ruled otherwise. The committee also unanimously endorsed Mrs. Frank Wolverson for the position of postmistress.

## LABOR GROUP FAVORS SIX HOUR DAY

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 28 (UP)—The nation's largest labor organization voted its approval today of a six-hour working day with a five day week and permanent government regulation of the bituminous coal industry.

The action was taken in sanctioning recommendations of the international officers of the United Mine Workers of America for a program looking toward rehabilitation of the coal mining industry. More than 1,000 miners, from 20 states and two Canadian provinces, meeting in the 32nd convention of the union, adopted suggestions of their officers almost without debate.

Previously, however, a discordant note had been sounded over management of the union and the salaries of international officers. The insurgents were quieted today after President John L. Lewis reviewed the struggle of the mine union for recognition, and delegates from Indiana and Ohio had voiced approval of their union to the administration's policies.

In discussing the shorter working schedule, the officers pointed out that this recommendation had been supported by the union for several years as a panacea for the industry's employment ills. It was regarded as a means of equalizing employment.

The government regulation plan provides for a federal coal commission with which coal operators must be licensed. It would allow miners freedom in organization and enable them to "negotiate collectively" for their wage agreements. Included in the plan, also, is a provision prohibiting coal operators from forcing their employes to agree not to join labor organizations.

"The entire plan," Lewis told the delegates, "provides for freedom of existence of the nation's coal miners."

## POSSE SEEKS BANK BANDITS

HAYNESVILLE, La., Jan. 28. (UP)—A sheriff's posse of 150 men tonight were searching for four men who abandoned their automobile near here today after robbing the Planters Bank & Trust company of \$17,000 and escaping under a barrage of gunfire from citizens.

One of the bandits was wounded, but escaped with his companions. Twenty-five or more shots were exchanged as the bandits retreated from the bank after President A. H. Southern had jumped through a window and sounded the alarm.

Southern and four other bank officials had been forced to lie on the floor while three unmasked bandits took all available currency. A fourth man waited outside in an automobile, later found abandoned 30 miles south of here.

## RUM SUSPECTS ARE ARRESTED

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 28. (UP)—Eight suspected higher-ups in an alleged conspiracy to violate the national prohibition act were arrested by federal prohibition agents tonight in the first open effort to halt liquor smuggling between Bimini and the Florida coast.

The government allegedly went into the bootlegging business itself, on a large scale, to obtain evidence during months of secret investigation, it was revealed. Warrants for the arrests were issued by Judge H. T. Ritter of the U. S. district court.

## UTAH WOMAN DIES IN CRASH

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Jan. 28. (UP)—Mrs. F. M. Davis, 49, wife of a prominent Tooele, Utah, physician, was fatally injured tonight when an automobile in which she was riding, overturned, pinning her beneath. The automobile struck soft snow at the side of the road, Marion Davis, 29, son of the dead woman, who was driving the car, said. The accident occurred on the Salt Lake-Tooele highway.

Mrs. Davis suffered a fractured pelvis and internal injuries, attending physicians said. She was rushed to a hospital where she died shortly after arriving there.

## DRAMA RAIDER SENT TO JAIL

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 28. (UP)—A police captain who refused to pay a fine was jailed today because he ignored a restraining order and conducted two raids upon "Lysistrata," rollicking Greek comedy which was playing in an exclusive theater.

Capt. D. MacD. Jones, head of the vice squad, was fined \$100 for contempt of court, but refused to pay the fine, choosing instead to serve a 50-day sentence in the county jail.

## FORD FINANCES ARE PUBLISHED

LANSING, Mich., Jan. 28. (UP)—The Ford Motor company's statement of its condition as of Dec. 31, 1931, filed today, showed a surplus and undivided profit of \$70,888,246. This did not include \$170,850,912 cash which was set aside for depreciation.

The statement showed assets of \$112,482,000 inventory, and \$284,519,000 in land, buildings and machinery.

Liabilities included notes and accounts payable amounting to \$45,315,919 and accrued expenses of \$9,363,578.

Vegans and Boulder City Folks To Eat Championship Meat

Las Vegas may now eat "grand champion" steaks from grand champion beef, according to announcement made yesterday that nine steers from the carload judged champions at the Ogden livestock show last week were to arrive in Las Vegas at the L & K markets this morning.

Steaks from this prize beef are now being served at the Boulder Drug cafe, who purchase their meats direct from the American Packing company in Ogden. The Boulder Drug cafe is offering them as "Grand Champion Steaks" from the finest beef in the west.

This beef was selected as champion of all shown from all intermountain states, and is of a grade declared to be fancy in all markets of the world.

The heaves arriving this morning at the L & K markets came from the grand champion carload of fat steers, bred, raised and fattened by C. N. Liljenquist, of Hyrum, Utah. They were of the Hereford strain, famous the world over as a fine beef breed, and familiarly called by cowmen, "whiteface cattle."

The heaves were 13 months old and averaged 867 pounds live weight. They dressed 62 per cent in beef and were judged and made grand champions by Bill Livingston, head cattle buyer for Allan Brothers of San Francisco.

They were declared champion out of a competing lot of 50 car loads of cattle shipped from all of the intermountain states. The meat will be placed on display and for sale at the L & K markets of this city at no advance in price.
