MAIL ORDER FIRM REPORTS LOSSES

CHICAGO, Jan. 30. (UP)—Montgomery Ward & Co. today reported net operating loss of \$8,712,023.24 for 1931. This included administrative expenses, property depreciation and taxes. Sales for the year aggregated \$198,118,045.56 while all charges amounted to \$206,830,943.24. The balance on hand was reduced from \$35,254,423.72 on the first of the year to \$14,514,582.24 on December 31. Dividends, general reserves, investment losses on securities and properties and bad debts plus the operating loss brought the cash balance down. The total sales were the lowest since 1927 and compared with \$249,097,223 last year and the 1929 record net of \$207,325,503.

ENTIRE FLEET OF U. S. AT MANILA IS READY

(Continued from Page One) provide all the ships' bottoms to evacuate them, if mob rule conditions make it dangerous for them to remain there. Any operations of the fleet will be carried out independently. Objections from any of the combatants can have little effect. Practically, "We can't draw any line as to who objects," he said. "If anyone objects, we are sorry." America's protest to Japan is the second to result from the Chinese-Japanese imbroglio. This also is the second time the United States and Great Britain have acted in unison to protect their rights in Shanghai. They made representations to Tokyo earlier this week, before the Shanghai invasion, expressing the hope that Japanese troops would not be used in the international settlement.

SURPRISE ATTACK (The precise wording of the American protest, made verbally by Ambassador W. Cameron to the Japanese foreign office, was not made public by the state department. The state department took the position that the Japanese attack on Chapel, accompanied by the dropping of bombs, endangered the entire port of Shanghai, including the international settlement. Some 5,000 American civilians, as well as 1,200 United States marines live there. American officials also took exception to the suddenness and surprise element of the Japanese attack. Secretary Stimson refused to discuss Ambassador De Bucht's visit. He declined to say whether De Bucht's assurances could be regarded as a reply to the American protest. Inasmuch as the state department announced its protest after the ambassador's call, however, it was taken for granted this newest "diplomatic incident" between America and Japan was not closed.)
