MARKETS AT A GLANCE

NEW YORK, Feb. 1. (U.P.)—Harking back to the World war days when the entire American industrial machine was speeded up, the stock market traders today bought large blocks of stock that could conceivably benefit from increased business if the Far East hostilities are extended. War rumors began to have their effect on the stock market when various "war bride" stocks like the steels, coppers, munitions and aviation stocks turned upward. Today's reports of increased seriousness in the Sino-Japanese situation were used for a further bullish demonstration in stocks of this character.

Aviation stocks, which would benefit greatly by extended war operations, showed their greatest strength in months; steels were strong; coppers firm and ammunition issues like Atlas Powder and Du Pont rose sharply. Rumors of impending war purchases, all unconfirmed, swept through the financial district and fanned speculative enthusiasm.

Traders recalled such sensational rises in similar stocks in 1915 when this country began to feel the effects of heavy supply purchases. Traders realized conditions now are far different than in 1915, but at the same time the war talk provided an excellent basis for speculative activity and took traders' minds off the drab domestic business picture.

Aside from the war talk, Wall street was cheered by the announcement over the week-end that railroad labor unions had accepted the 10 per cent wage "deduction" proposed by the railroads. This move, which will save the carriers \$215,000,000 annually, less their promised employment compensations, was expected to stimulate considerable buying of equipment by railroads.

Other favorable factors were maintenance of regular dividends by the three largest Standard Oil units, payments of which had been questioned because none of them were believed to be earning their current payments. The declarations include 25 cents regular and 25 cents extra by New Jersey; 25 cents regular by Indiana and 25 cents regular by Socny-Vacuum.

Best gains today were made by United Aircraft, Bethlehem Steel, Atlas Powder, Du Pont, Allied Chemical, Eastman Kodak and the Curtis-Wright issues. Among the rumors that went the rounds coincident with strength in "war" issues was one that Bethlehem Steel has received an order from the United States government for \$500,000 tons of steel to be used for ammunition. Other rumors were promptly denied by the companies affected. Japanese bonds again were weak as were New South Wales issues on an interest default. The Japanese yen rallied moderately and wheat was helped by the war clouds. Cotton failed to respond to announcement of heavy current and prospective shipments to the Orient.

Gains in stocks ranged from one to more than half dozen points with activity again centered on the better-known issues. Turn-over approximated Friday's dealings of 1,500,000 shares. Prices were firm throughout, ending at or near their best levels of the movement.

KANSAS CITY, Feb. 1. (U.P.)—Light receipts sent hogs 10 to 15 cents higher on the Kansas City livestock market today. Cattle and sheep held barely steady, with a tendency for weakness. Yearlings ranged from \$4.50 to \$7.50. Top fat hogs brought \$3.95, and the bulk of sales ranged from \$3.75 to \$3.90. Lambs sold within the narrow range of \$5.75 to \$6.
