HOOVER DAM PROJECT OFFERS 71 MILLION MEN-DAYS AS ITS PART IN AIDING JOB PROBLEM

When the Hoover dam has been completed, an average number of nearly 4,000 employes will have rolled up the stupendous number of 71,500,000 man-days worked, by the typical dam worker of 37 years of age, white, American born, and representing every state in the Union.

This almost unbelievable total, an official estimate based on the employment figures of the contractor, represents the contribution made by the construction of the dam to the unemployment situation in the United States.

Almost every classification of skilled laborer, engineer and technical man will have contributed to the enormous undertaking when it is completed.

Government engineers and surveyors, geologists and topographers, were the first to appear on the scene, two years before the actual start of construction.

Within the short space of eight months has arisen in that same desert waste a city. Modern homes, steam heated and electrically lighted, paved streets, and busy stores completed the picture until at the present time workmen from all branches of the many sided construction job are housed in a town of over 4,000 souls.

The work itself has gone ahead apace, and in spite of a strike which tied up the whole job for some time, the contractors recently announced that all phases of the work were a full six months ahead of the original construction schedule.
