MARKETS AT A GLANCE

NEW YORK, Feb. 3. (U.P.)—Dull trading and narrow price movements continued on the stock exchange today as traders puzzled over such uncertain factors as the Far East hostilities, prospects of further business improvement and several important pending dividend declarations.

Of primary interest today was the General Motors dividend meeting after the close of the market, a factor that caused traders to "go slow." Early expectations were borne out, directors ordering a reduction in the current annual common dividend from \$3 to \$2 a share.

Few traders were willing to make large commitments in advance of this meeting, however, and activity dwindled to approximately 800,000 shares, compared with 1,100,000 shares yesterday. Prices pursued an irregular course through the first four hours of trading but lifted in the final hours to show gains of fraction to several points in the leaders.

Action of the United States Steel corporation in offering 200,000 of its common stock to employees at \$40 a share was taken to mean that directors do not expect much further decline, if any, in the stock and so many more shares of the stock are taken out of the open market.

Steel common was one of the firm spots in today's market and was an important factor in bringing about late improvement. The issue quickly rose above \$40 a share in the early trading and closed with a gain of more than a point at 40 1/4.

Other important shares with few exceptions followed the lead, even General Motors advancing fractionally despite fears of the dividend reduction. DuPont, on the other hand, which owns 9,981,220 shares of General Motors and which will suffer a loss of \$9,981,220 annually by the dividend reduction, was heavy. The General Motors cut is equivalent to 90 cents a share on the outstanding 11,065,762 Du Pont common shares, which earned only \$4.26 last year and paid \$4 a share in dividends. Du Pont directors meet the middle of this month for dividend action but many expect to see the regular quarterly dividend of \$1 declared even though the company is not likely to earn it.

Another weak spot was Auburn Auto, which closed several points lower on rumors that the powerful pool in the stock was disbanding. At the same time, reports came from the middle west of a pending investigation into the action of the stock by the stock exchange.

Brokers here said they had heard nothing regarding an investigation. The weekly steel reviews saw a slight loss in operations following the January spurt but held the hope that the recent railroad wage reduction might provide the carriers with funds for purchase of new equipment. The weekly car loadings statistics showed continued slump compared with a year ago.

Issues of a Japanese nature continued to absorb interest in the bond market, these securities continuing their recovery with the break-up of the financial storm that closed the Tokyo stock exchange yesterday. On the foreign exchange market, Italian lire soared on short covering.
