MARKETS AT A GLANCE

NEW YORK, Feb. 5. (U.P.)—Renewed selling in the stock market today met with little resistance and professional traders were able to drive prices to within striking distance of the extreme lows reached in the first week of the new year.

Bears quietly put out fresh short lines in the early trading. When prices yielded readily offerings increased and the close found leaders down from one to more than half dozen points.

While the volume of trading increased sharply over the previous session, it still was below what is considered normal. Approximately 1,100,000 shares changed hands. Public interest again was apathetic and the greater part of the selling merely represented sales by floor traders eager to seize a few points' profit.

Accompanying the new weakness was the usual batch of rumors of pool suspensions and "weak" situations overhanging the market. So far as could be learned, the only important selling made its appearance in Auburn Auto, in which the pool was reported to be disbanding early in the week.

Generally speaking, however, most pressure was centered on the railroad list. As the rails have been the market leaders for the past year, this was interpreted by some traders as indicating lower prices for industrials. Others were not so pessimistic but it was generally agreed that the market was headed for a test of its bear market low made earlier in the year.

Another decline like today's would bring the list to approximately these levels. A sustained stand by the bulls at that point would be interpreted favorably and much buying that ordinarily would come into the market is believed to have been withheld pending this test.

Selling of the rails today was stimulated by the application for a loan by the Pennsylvania railroad to the reconstruction finance corporation to assist in financing its New Jersey electrification project. Because this strong road was seeking new funds, many traders took an adverse outlook toward many of the less favorably situated carriers. High grade issues like Union Pacific, Santa Fe and New York Central, however, were prominent in the decline.

Publication of financing plans for the Allegheny corporation, holding company for the Van Sweringen railroad interests, reacted against the less favorably situated carriers. Ohio breaking more than 2 points to within a fraction of the extreme low for the present shares. The decline in this issue recently has been less than in any other railroad stock.

The largest loss in the industrial division was suffered by Auburn Auto, which dropped 8 1/2 points to a new low on the current movement at 11 on a flood of selling orders.

The decline in leaders like Steel common, Westinghouse Electric and American Can, however, was held to limits of about 2 points each, although most of them closed around their lows of the day. Weakness in grains and the heavy sellings worked against J. I. Case, which fell nearly 3 points. General Electric, among the former "blue chip" issues, lost a point to another new low for the present shares.

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK KANSAS CITY, Feb. 5. (U.P.)—Light supplies sent hogs up another point in the Kansas City livestock market. Sheep and cattle, with supplies and demand moderate, continued steady.

Steers and yearlings sold from \$4 to \$7. Top fat hogs brought \$4 and the bulk of sales ranged to \$4. Lambs sold from \$4 to \$6.75.
