TRANSPORTATION PROBLEM AT RIVER COMPLEX AS THAT OF STATE, ENGINEERS DISCOVER

Railroads and Cables Used Throughout Rough Area

As the Hoover Dam construction progresses, transportation problems comparable to those of entire states are being worked out by Six Companies and government engineers, according to official estimates.

Railroad and truck transportation facilities have been provided for the transportation of men and materials to all parts of the job now under construction, and additional facilities will be provided as the job progresses and requires access to new locations.

EXPENSIVE OPERATION

Railroad transportation from Las Vegas to the reservation, and over the reservation to various key points was probably the most expensive operation in establishing a complete transportation system. The Union Pacific railroad built a branch line from Las Vegas to Boulder City, a distance of 22 miles, while the government built an additional eight miles of railroad to a point near the Colorado. While the construction of these two sections of the railroad system were still under way, Six Companies built an additional 22 miles of railroad, communicating

with the gravel pits in Arizona, seven miles up-river, and along the canyon, involving engineering problems of considerable magnitude.

Estimates of the traffic that this railroad system will carry indicate that on the short system, the density of traffic will exceed that of any section of the west. Some 700,000 tons of material will be moved by the busy time ahead for the system, which will require a standard operating personnel and system such as in use on the large roads of the company, may be estimated by official estimates of the equipment to be ultimately required, and the haulage to be performed.

GRAVEL HAULING

Quoting the official estimate: "The heavy hauling will require 70 to 100 gravel cars and 11 locomotives . . . and during a period of five years will haul approximately 440,000,000 tons of combined dead and live load. The equipping and operating of this railroad will cost about \$2,000,000 in addition to the cost of construction."

A well-developed road and highway system, of expensive construction, will carry at least 2500 men to and from the scene of operations in the canyon throughout the construction period. Over three hundred pieces of heavy duty motor equipment, aside from the many passenger cars operated by the contractors and the government forces.

Finally, a new and novel use of the high line cableways of from ten to twenty ton capacity will be employed. They will be used for the transportation of men, equipment, and materials, in places where it is not feasible or possible to use highways.

STATE TO OIL BOULDER ROAD

The state highway department, under direction of C. C. Boyer, today will complete the application of 60,000 gallons of road oil to the highway between Railroad Pass and Boulder City.

The oil has been applied as a dust palliative to serve temporarily and the usual oiled gravel surface will be completed at a later date when the weather is warmer by A. D. Drumm, contractor.

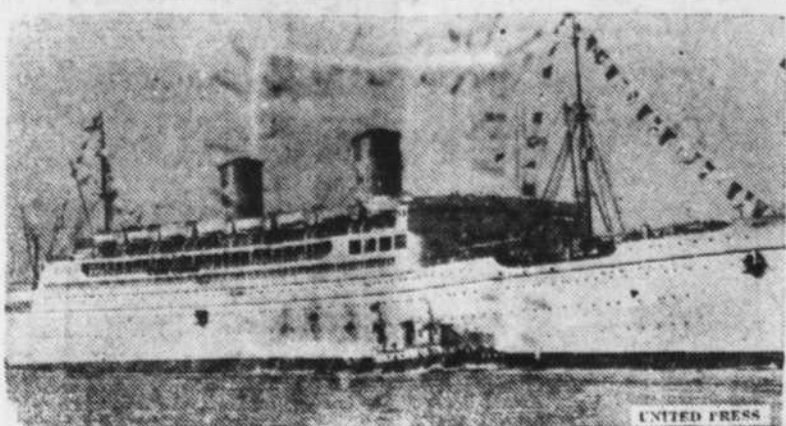

FINANCING FOR THEATER IS COMPLETE

Arrangements were completed yesterday for financing and building the proposed new Palace theatre, by City Commissioner Roscoe Thomas and Arthur Brick, former Los Angeles motion picture producer.

The new Palace theatre will be located on Second street on the property formerly owned by the late E. E. Smith and long occupied by the W. N. Shuyler family. The site is just south of the present postoffice building.

The structure will be 40 by 120 feet in size and of the Spanish type of architecture, according to A. L. Worswick, the architect. The theatre will have six hundred seats and all furnishings, fittings and decorations will be of the most modern type.

There will be no stage, only sound pictures being contemplated. The equipment for this is of the approved type, it is stated.

On the second street frontage there will be a small shop on each side of the theatre lobby. Upstairs there will be three offices across the front.

The construction will be steel frame with steel roof girders. The walls will be of masonry, but whether of reinforced concrete, or concrete blocks, has not been decided. A cooling plant and steam heat will also be installed.
