

# DEMPSEY WILL DREYFUSS TO TRAIN FOR EXHIBIT SHOW

Jack Now Free To Go Ahead After Charge Of Board Dropped

CHICAGO, Feb. 6. (U.P.)—Jack Dempsey arrived from the west today temporarily settled a suspension meted out to him by the Mississippi state athletic commission and plunged into training for the first appearance of his second exhibition tour of four round bouts beginning at Milwaukee Monday night.

After a hearing of the Mississippi case before the National Boxing association, General John V. Clinin, N. B. A. president, announced that Dempsey's suspension would remain lifted at least until a hearing on or before April 15 at Jackson, Miss.

The charges against Dempsey are that he was co-promoter of a boxing show at Columbus, Miss., Nov. 10, 1930, for which the sum of \$2894.97 remains unpaid. Dempsey and his manager, Leonard Sacks, claim Dempsey was only the referee and had nothing to do with the promoting end.

"Dempsey did not receive one cent for his services and besides had to pay for his own railroad fare and mine," said Sacks.

Col. Harry J. Landry and Col. Luther Maples, whose expenses to Chicago were paid by Dempsey, represented the Mississippi commission and stressed the fact that the failure of Sacks to cooperate with them was largely responsible for the present entanglement.

"It is not our intention to persecute Dempsey," said Landry. "We merely wish to maintain the reputation of the Mississippi commission and settle a controversy of long standing."

Jack Kearns, Fields' manager, said the preliminary details had been arranged by long distance telephone and that the fighters will sign next Tuesday.

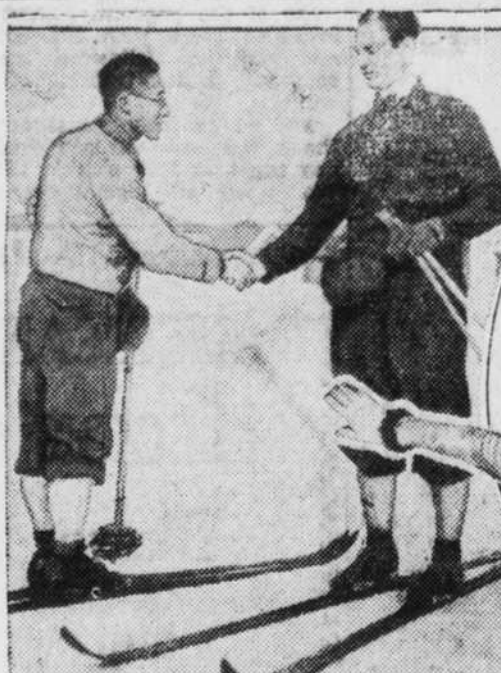
Safety papers from a safety deposit box in Los Angeles and appear before the Mississippi commission on or before April 15, and assist in clearing up the matter.

## BILLIARD TIE STILL HELD

CHICAGO, Feb. 6. (U.P.)—Otto Reisel, Philadelphia, dropped to second place when he was beaten by Arthur Thurnblad, Chicago, defending titleholder, by 50 to 38 in 49 innings in the world's championship three-cushion billiard tournament this afternoon.

This setback placed Augie Kleckhefer, Chicago, in first place with seven games won and two lost. Reisel has won seven and lost three while Thurnblad ended his schedule with seven won and four lost.

Thurnblad is virtually assured of a tie for second place as the fight now rests between Kleckhefer and Reisel, who will meet in the final game Monday night.

## NET PLAYERS GIVEN RANKS

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 6. (U.P.)—America's amateur tennis players were officially ranked today at the annual meeting of the U. S. Lawn Tennis association. Earlier recommendations of the nominating committee were upheld, with one minor exception in the women's division.

Officers of the association also were reelected with the exception of Paul W. Gibbons, Philadelphia, who was removed from the secretaryship after prolonged debate and a close vote.

Ellsworth Vines, Jr., Pasadena, Calif., became the official No. 1 player. George M. Litt, Jr., Chicago, was ranked No. 2; Francis X. Shields, New York, No. 3; John Van Ryn, Philadelphia, 4; John H. Doeg, Newark, N. J., 5; Clifford Sutter, New Orleans, 6; Sidney B. Wood, Jr., New York, 7; Keith Wiedhill, Santa Barbara, Calif., 8; Wilmer Allison, Austin, Tex., 9; and Berkeley Bell, New York, No. 10.

The first controversy of the meeting arose when the question of ranking Bruce Barnes, Texas university star, in the intercollegiate group, was brought up. Barnes turned professional last fall, joining with Tilden's tour.

**DEFEATS CLUB CHAMP**  
ST. AUGUSTINE, Fla., Feb. 6. (U.P.)—For the second consecutive year, T. Philip Perkins, former British amateur golf champion today won the national championship of club champions here, defeating G. Bayard Mitchell of Woodbury, N. J., 4 and 3.

Perkins is the only player in the history of the event to capture the title two years in a row.

## WOLVES AGAIN BEAT FRESNO

FRESNO, Cal., Feb. 6. (U.P.)—University of Nevada's basketball team cleaned up its two-game series with Fresno State by taking tonight's game, 31-24. Last night they won by 44-34.

Tonight's game left the institutions' athletic relations, none too amiable of recent months, in an unimproved condition. Both are members of the Far Western conference, and trouble between them appeared last fall over the eligibility of football players.

The Nevadans were undisputed masters of the play tonight, and repeated rulings against the Staters did not help the temper of at least one spectator.

## GAR WOOD MARK IS NOT ALLOWED

NEW YORK, Feb. 6. (U.P.)—The office of H. B. Greening, chairman of the racing commission of the American Power Boat association, today announced that the mark of 111.712 miles per hour set by Gar Wood in his Miss America IX yesterday will not be recognized as an American record.

This action was taken because the Yachtsman's Association of America, which sponsored the speed test, did not apply to the A. P. B. A. for sanction. Wood's mark, however, may be recognized as a world record.
