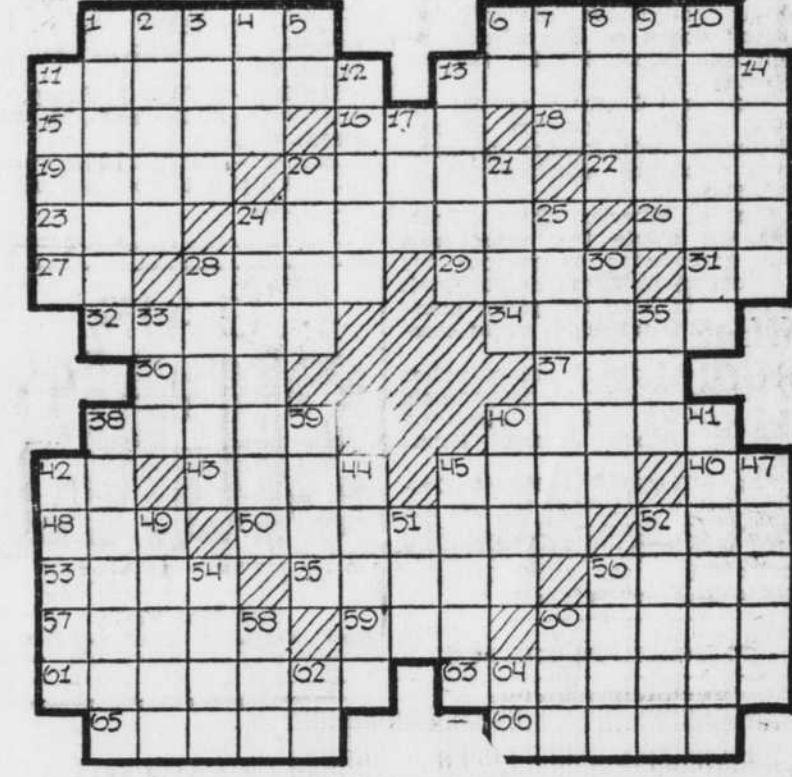

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Feb. 8. (U.P.)—Heavy receipts today took their toll of hog and sheep prices on the Kansas City livestock market. Slightly below normal receipts held cattle steady.

Steers and yearlings sold from \$4.50 to \$5.50. Top fat hogs brought \$3.90, 10 cents lower, and the bulk of sales ranged from \$3.75 to \$3.85. Lambs were from 25 to 50 cents below last week's close, selling from \$6 to \$6.50.

MARKETS AT A GLANCE

NEW YORK, Feb. 8. (U.P.)—Bear traders made repeated selling attacks on the stock market today in an effort to force prices under the extreme bear market lows reached last month.

Constant hammering of a few pivotal issues did succeed in unsettling the market but the close found the list as a whole holding its own. A few leaders like United States Steel, American Telephone and Western Union closed with small gains.

Savage selling attacks were centered on other leaders. J. I. Case broke more than 3 points and smaller declines occurred in General Electric, International Harvester, Anaconda and Atchison, all these shares selling at new bear market lows.

The selling was attributed to professional operations by a group of Chicago speculators. The ease in which Auburn Auto gave way last week evidently encouraged such operations and pressures were heavy on these shares throughout the day.

The market generally was reluctant to follow the lead of these shares and bulls mustered support on the theory that the market was entitled to a sharp comeback if it resisted selling around the lows of the bear market. Compared with the January 3 lows, the Dow-Jones averages at the close showed above their low; rails at 33.01, or 1.65 points above and utilities at 30.33, or 0.69 point above.

Opinion in speculative quarters was that a test of these lows was imminent, possibly tomorrow. A good deal of potential buying power is awaiting this test and refusal of the general list to go into new low ground might attract considerable buying. A break below these levels, according to observers would attract more liquidation and heavy professional selling.

In addition to today's professional raid the market was forced to absorb general selling in issues like General Electric, General Motors and Chesapeake and Ohio, whose present dividends are not considered any too secure. Weakness in C. and D. spread to other rails like Atchison and New York Central, the latter being particularly weak for unexplained reasons.

Holders of copper stocks liquidated as the price of the metal continued to sag. Sales of copper were made today at a new record low level at 6 cents a pound, a level at which no important American producer can mine the metal and make money.

Traders continued to look upon the new low ground with disfavor despite expectations in some quarters that motor output this year

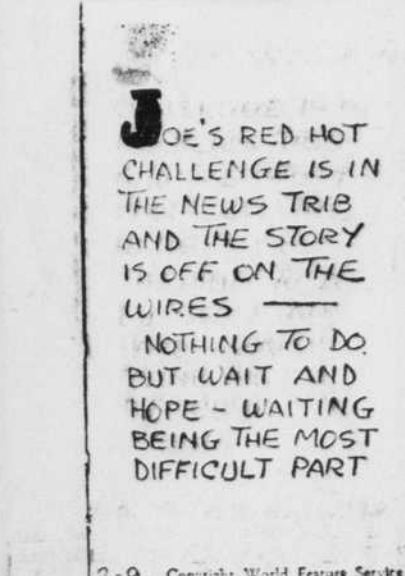
