

In isolated instances only. however, were leaders driven to new lows. Other pivotal shares sold off only moderately.

Dow-Jones stock averages at the close found the industrials at 72.38 compared with the January 5 low of 71.25; rails at 32.76, compared with 31.36 and utilities at 29.94 low of 29.64.

Professional sellers centered their attack on the automobile stocks. Auburn Auto continued to furnish strong leadership for the decline, breaking nearly 10 points at one time to well under the 100-level Several sales of General Motors of 10,000 shares each took place at 20, or only a fraction above the extreme low made in January. Packard and Nash were unloaded in large blocks at new low levels. Important offerings also converged on the railroad group and on shares with a weak outside following like J. I. Case, American Telephone and General Electric. Strong support, however, again was apparently in both United States Steel and Western Union, which closed with only small loss-American Can and Westing-

house also held well above their recent lows. New York Central and Atchison in the rails bore heaviest pressure this group, the former selling at

the lowest price in its history. Predictions that the United States Steel corporation's January unfilled order statement to be public at noon tomorrow would show the tenth consecutive monthly decrease had little effect on the price of this leader in which a large short interest has locked. Demand for the stock for borrowing purposes continued heavy at the close.

A few important shares like American Telephone, General Electric and Standard Oil of New Jersey contributed under pressure on fears of early downward dividend revisions. None of these companies has yet reduced its dividend, but all are expected to reduce their payments before the end of the year.
